ADDRESS ON EDUCATION.—S. Y. Gilliam, editor of the Milwaukee (Wis.) Teacher, lectured to a large assembly of city and country teachers at the High School yesterday morning. His subject was "Educational Progress of the Nineteenth Century," and he gave an interesting account of the development of the American public school from the time it was first established in 1815 to the close of 1900. Mr. Gilliam is making a tour of the Pacific Coast and speaking at teachers' institutes and other educational assemblies at the same time. He expects to address the teachers and friends of education at Pendleton this week.
