For I know my photograph In her eyes will loving laugh When she puts it on the mantel in a stand.

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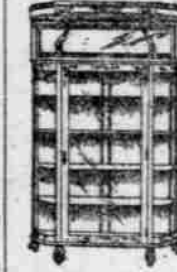
