

WHEN A. O. U. W. COMES

LOCAL ORDER PREPARING FOR SUPREME LODGE IN JUNE, 1902.

Complete Programme of Entertainment to Be Arranged—400 Delegates Will Come.

The Grand Lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen is now making preparation for the reception of the Supreme Lodge of the A. O. U. W. which is to meet in this city on the second Tuesday in June, 1902. The committee that will have charge of the reception was named at the last Grand Lodge and consists of: Grand master workman, C. C. Hogue, chairman; past grand master workman, R. L. Durham; Ralph Peasey, W. D. Hare, Newton Clarke; past master workman, J. W. Paddock; Fred Stevens and J. R. Mann. This committee will have entire charge of the entertainment of guests and will be divided into sub-committees to take the different branches of work in hand.

The last Grand Lodge appropriated \$750 toward the expenses of entertainment and \$500 will also be received from the Supreme Lodge. Besides this, the committee will have to raise several thousand dollars by subscription to cover the remainder of the expenses.

The session will commence on the 10th of June and continue for about 10 days. In connection with the Supreme Lodge will be the Superior Lodge of Ladies' Auxiliary of the A. O. U. W. There will be about 400 delegates to the meeting, and many of these will bring their families, and swell the number of visitors to at least 1000. Those who are to come here are representative people of their respective communities, including several Governors, well-known bankers, and lawyers.

The committee is now arranging with the transportation companies for a trip up the Columbia River by water and also one on the lower river. Another plan under consideration, to give the visitors an idea of the Willamette Valley, is an excursion to Albany, going up on the west side of the river and returning on the east side.

The meeting is to devise general legislation for the good of the lodge. The question of hazardous risks may also be taken up at this session, but it is not definitely known as yet. Another point that will be considered is the adoption of a new ritual. This matter has been in the hands of a committee for several years. At the last Supreme Lodge five or six copies were submitted to the assembly, but none of them was adopted. As a consequence, the matter was continued for another year, and the prize offered to the person drafting the best ritual was increased to \$800.

The Ancient Order of United Workmen was organized October 27, 1878. The organization now numbers 45,000 members in 40 jurisdictions embracing all the states in the union, and all of the provinces of Canada. A leading object of A. O. U. W. is to care for the widows and orphans of its deceased members.

FIGHT FOR A DRY STATE.

Arid Programme Mapped Out by the Prohibitionists.

The prohibition campaign this time will be a campaign of education in Oregon, according to State Chairman I. H. Amos. A number of noted speakers will be here from the East, and prohibition alliances will be formed in every county. These alliances will be composed of three different factors—the active workers, the associate branch, and the juniors. The first named will work in the campaign and vote the ticket at its close; the associates are friends of temperance who are favorable to prohibition, but who have not yet decided to vote for it. The juniors are young people whose education along temperance lines has been fostered in their homes. Regular meetings of the alliances will be held and programmes suggested by the National central organization carried out.

"The prohibition party leaders have heretofore made the mistake of beginning at the top, when they should have commenced at the foundation," said Mr. Amos yesterday. "By educating the young people to a realization of the dangers from the whisky traffic we are bringing on an army to take the places of the elders when the latter have passed away. The good work of the juniors is already manifesting itself in the numerous orators of ability being produced by our colleges, where oratorical contests have evolved some 'hot numbers,' who, when maintaining the prohibition side, always beat their opponents."

We all hope to see the day when the Government will be no longer a partner in the business of liquor-selling, and if we can get the people who are opposed to the saloon business to vote with us, the object will be accomplished. Once let the reins of Government be held by the prohibition party and the people would never consent to a return of the liquor power."
