

WILL NOT DISCUSS POLICY

GOVERNOR SHAW DOES NOT SAY WHAT HE WILL DO IN TREASURY.

Speaks of Secretary Gage's Administration in the Most Complimentary Terms.

DES MOINES, Dec. 28.—Governor Shaw, when seen by the Associated Press correspondent, denied having given an interview regarding Secretary Gage's Treasury policy. On the contrary, he has positively refused to give interviews. He has, however, spoken in most cordial terms of approval of Secretary Gage's administration of the department.

The Governor has been very busy all day receiving congratulations by wire and mail and entertaining visitors who called to pay their respects. The Governor has not yet been received by Governor Shaw, but is expected hourly.

Governor Shaw says he positively refused to be interviewed on any subject in respect to the asset currency question or in respect to his or Secretary Gage's administration of the Treasury Department. He has, however, said that the nearest he came to an expression of an opinion on the asset currency question was in a speech delivered at Norfolk, Neb., April 22, in which he said he had nothing to say on the subject of bank circulation based on assets.

PRIVATE INTERFERENCE

HAMPERS THE WORK ABROAD OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT.

Instances of the Difficulties in the Way of Diplomacy in Dealing With Germany.

BERLIN, Dec. 28.—American diplomacy in Berlin, so far as it relates to commercial controversies, is hampered by the interference of the private interests concerned. The force of the representations of the State Department has been continually impaired by American business men acting independently of diplomatic channels. This is the startling purpose of a communication made to the correspondent of the Associated Press today by a personage closely related to the Foreign Office, from whom something was sought more candid than the Foreign Office.
