## NOTED CHRISTIAN SCIENTIST WILL SPEAK AT THE MARQUAM

Hon. William G. Ewing, of Chicago, will speak on "Christian Science" at 3 o'clock today at the Marquam Theater. No admission will be charged, and the public is cordially invited to attend.

This will be Judge Ewing's second visit to Portland in the capacity of lecturer, he having spoken here some two years ago on the subject, "Christian Science, the Religion of Jesus Christ," at which time the theater was crowded to its capacity. His present lecture, entitled "Christian Science, Physical and Redemptive," deals with the subject in its twofold aspect, incidentally as a healing agency and primarily as a religion which practically regenerates and redeems. Judge Ewing is being brought here by the local Christian Science churches, the First and Second Churches of Christ, Scientist.

Judge Ewing is one of a board of 12 lecturers, known as the International board of lecturers of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Boston, Mass., established for the purpose of placing Christian Science in its true light before the public and correcting the misconceptions as may exist regarding its teaching and practice. In pursuance with this purpose, these lecturers have for the past four years been addressing large audiences throughout the United States, Canada and Great Britain, everywhere being received with courtesy and interest, and many erroneous conceptions regarding this rapidly growing denomination have been corrected through their earnest efforts.

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## THE LIFE HEREAFTER.

## Does Man's Soul Undergo Any Change After Death?

PORTLAND, Feb. 15.—(To the Editor.)—While the Presbyterian creed committee is deciding whether those dying in infancy are to suffer eternal torment or enjoy everlasting bliss, why not go a step further and decide at what stage of its individual development the disembodied soul of the infant will spend its eternal life? Will the soul of this newborn child remain in its undeveloped state, with only enough gumption to give vent to an everlasting "goo" at the sound of the celestial harp music—I haven't the heart to postulate the sulphuric condition—or will its psychic powers be developed in heaven under the same hard conditions of "the struggle for life" which educate man here below?

This matter settled, other analogous questions could be easily disposed of. For example, Will the young man of promising talent be able to unfold his rich, unused powers in the hereafter? Will the feeble, childish old man, who in his prime had enriched the world with his genius, live forever in mental decay? Or will he return to an earlier stage of his mental powers?

The student of Haeckel may assert that these questions are not material, for the reason that "the soul" is merely a collective title for the sum total of man's cerebral functions. In view of the fact that the death of the ganglionic cells their functions also cease. However, Haeckel may not know it quite all, but if he doesn't, the creed committee surely does.

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## Lewis and Clark Journals.

It is announced that Dodd, Mead & Co. will soon publish verbatim the journals of Lewis and Clark. Extracts from their journals were published in various forms, as official documents, and as more popular compilations, the most important contemporary work being the two volumes published in Philadelphia in 1814, one of which has always been considered the best edition of the Lewis and Clark travels, was, according to the title page, "prepared for the press by Paul Allen."

It is known that the book was prepared under the direction of Nicholas Biddle. As a matter of fact, however, these volumes do not contain the journals themselves, but only a condensed version. The complete journals have never been printed.

In making the announcement the publishers say: "The manuscript of these journals is still in existence, belonging to the American Philosophical Society, Philadelphia. In view of the centennial of the Louisiana Purchase, which is to be commemorated by the St. Louis Exposition, in 1903, and the Oregon Centennial of the Lewis and Clark expedition, to be celebrated in 1905, Messrs. Dodd, Mead & Co. have made arrangements with the society which owns the journals for their publication for the first time, exactly word for word as written. This new and authoritative edition is to be edited by Reuben Gold Thwaites, of the Wisconsin Historical Society, most competent of living men for the work, by reason of his long and careful study of everything relating to the early settlement of the West. This edition will supersede even the scholarly work edited by the late Professor Elliot Coues, published a few years ago, the basis of whose edition was the old incomplete edition of 1814. The Coues did not even know of the existence of the manuscript journals until his work was nearly completed and ready for the press, and comparatively little use was made of them."
