Club Bowlers Capture Interstate Championship.

SEATTLE'S STRONG FINISH

Local Men Only Take One Out of Three Games, But That Is Enough to Clinch Graham-Moore Trophy.

The interstate bowling tournament was concluded in this city last evening, and the representative of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club carried off the championship honors, winning permanent possession of the Graham-Moore trophy cup, which they have now won for three consecutive years. The Multnomah men were pitted against the bowlers of the Seattle Athletic Club, while the Commercial Club team contested on its own keys with the team from the Olympic Club, of Tacoma. The Seattle men outplayed Multnomah last evening, winning three games out of four, and having also a handsome lead in the count of pins, but Multnomah, by winning the one necessary game, increased the average sufficiently to win the championship, with Seattle and Olympic tied for second place. The best bowling was done on the M. A. A. C. alleys, where Bailey made a single score of 61, with Craft one point behind him, and Steiner, of Seattle, one point behind Craft. Bailey made the highest total score, 202, while Pope, of Seattle, made 194. The final game of the series, in which Seattle won, by a lead of 7 pins, was very exciting.

The Commercial Club representatives took three games to the Olympic one, contrary to the general expectation. Potter's single score of 56 was the best of the evening, while Graham led in the totals with 182 pins to his credit.

After the games the members of all four teams repaired to the parlors of the Commercial Club, where Prof. Frank Topping, of San Francisco, announced them by some very clever mind-reading and card tricks. A banquet was served afterwards, and the victors and the vanquished joined in a very merry celebration.

HOME Y. M. C. A. TEAM WINS.

Frangible Wins the Palace Hotel Handicap at Oakland.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22.—Frangible, ridden by Willie Knapp, one of the lightest riders in the country, won the Palace Hotel handicap at Oakland today, while Diderot beat Janice, the favorite, half a length for second money. Over 700 people were in attendance. The heavy condition of the track caused the scratching of several good horses who were either absent or did not start, and a field of eight went to the post to run for the \$2000 purse. Diderot and Frangible went out in front and raced together all the way. Diderot tired in the stretch and Frangible beat him over two lengths. O'Connor put up a poor exhibition on Janice, waiting too long with her. Knapp, who rode Diderot, claimed a foul against Knapp on Frangible, but it was not allowed. Frangible received strong support, being played from 10 to 1 to 6 to 1. The track was very heavy and horses that hugged the rail were returned winners. Favorites were Knapp, Nilgar, who was an equal choice with Frangible, being the only one to win. The finish in the third race at six furlongs was exciting. Wyosack beat Ingle, 30 to 1, by a neck in a fierce drive. Ingle made her first appearance of the season. She was 60 to 1 for the place and 20 to 1 to show. Sharp Bird, the favorite, stepped badly.
