SCORES THREE TRIUMPHS

BRILLIANT ACHIEVEMENT OF CHICAGO SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA. Great Masterpieces of Music Played by Skilled Musicians Under Conductor's Superb Control.

The Chicago orchestra, in its three concerts given in the last two days, has shown conclusively that it is an organization composed of rarely skilled musicians under a conductor that has his men under such superb control that they seem to be a single instrument in his hands.

Not since Theodore Thomas and his men came to the Pacific Coast, some 18 years ago, has a symphony orchestra visited this city. The Beethoven-Wagner program given last night probably had more grand and massive numbers on it than have ever before been heard in Portland.

It was a highly significant fact, and one for which the audience could hardly fall to be profoundly grateful, that the orchestra did its most faithful and conscientious work, not slighting a detail nor substituting easier numbers for the heavy ones down on the programme; but ready, instead, to respond heartily to the warm demonstrations of delight that came to them from over the footlights.

A leading feature of the two concerts given yesterday was the debut of Mr. Van Cordt, the solo violinist, and concertos were given with most delicious sweetness of tone and a remarkable display of technique. One wonders from what source he derives his nervous energy. His work brought a storm of enthusiasm.

There is a possibility of a return next year of this superb body of players. Portland concert-goers will bear in memory the exceptional art of their work during this engagement, and make amends next season for any lack of appreciation shown in this.
