SAD DEATH OF FOUR-YEAR-OLD BOY.—For the second time within two weeks, death has visited the little family of Mr. and Mrs. D. Miller, who are residing at 631 Third street. Two weeks ago one of their sons was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital, suffering from necrosis of the bone, but the disease had reached such an acute stage that a successful operation was out of the question, and the boy died. Yesterday another son, Nathan Miller, 4 years old, died from paralysis of the heart, due to fatigue following an attack of influenza. The Miller family, who live on Third street, were visiting Mrs. Miller's sister, who lives on Third street, and yesterday morning little Nathan appeared to be in his usual health, except that he had been suffering from an attack of cold. A physician had not been called, as the family did not think that the little boy was seriously sick, and they wished, if possible, to save expense. His mother had just given Nathan bread and milk, and had left the room for a moment to get some needed refreshment, when a cry called her to the sickroom, and she found her baby dying. Dr. Miller was sent for, but the boy was past medical aid. The facts were communicated to the Coroner, who decided that an inquest was not necessary. Mrs. Miller is prostrated.

MACHINERY FOR MOUNT BAKER MINE.—The Mount Baker Mining Company, of which H. Stanislawski, of this city, is manager, is now having the machinery for a 10-stamp mill and the cable for an aerial tramway hauled over the snow to the site selected for the mill. The machinery was hauled to within about 15 miles of the site last fall, which was as far as it could be hauled by teams. It has now been transferred to some half-dozen sleds, and a donkey engine and half-mile cable are in place and hauled ahead until the cable is run out. It is then attached to one after another of the loaded sleds, and they are hauled up to the engine, which is then moved to the site. The machinery is moved about half a mile per day, so that it will take about 30 days to get it to the site where it is to be installed. The one will be transported from the mine to the mill by an aerial tramway about a mile and a half in length. The company has invested \$10,000 in the mine and expects to get its money back before long. It has been blocked out which, it is figured, will produce \$1,000,000.

A COLONY IN ALABAMA.—The Co-operative Christian Federation, for which articles of incorporation have been filed, and has been founded by Rev. Herman S. Wallace, of Portland, formerly a Methodist minister of Junction City. Large acreage has been acquired in Benton and Lane counties, bonds have been sold for construction of a railroad to be called the Corvallis & Southern, and almost every branch of manufacturing will be engaged in. All members must agree to obey the teachings and practice the ethics of Christ at all times, in all things, under all conditions, with all people. Individual homes will be provided for all children will be educated at the University of Oregon and State Agricultural College, free doctors and nurses in sickness, and care of dependent ones will be guaranteed. The estimated value of present holdings of the community is \$150,000, and the incorporators are Rev. Herman S. Wallace, Harry D. Staley, Frances E. Gotschal, Ernest Barton, H. W. Gibbs, O. Stanley, Stella May Balingier and Mrs. Kate Wallace.

NEW BRICK BUILDING FOR LAUNDRY.—A two-story brick building, 60x100 feet, with a basement, is being erected by E. W. Bates at Second and Columbia streets, to be occupied as a laundry by the Union Laundry Company. As a laundry on Madison street, near Fifth, was not long ago condemned and closed as a nuisance, many have been wondering how a similar institution could be tolerated only a few blocks distant. Mr. Bates' reply to this is that the new laundry is not a "similarity" institution. It will be a strictly modern concern, with all the latest improvements. The boiler, engine and washing machines will be located in the basement, and the front, soiled clothing, etc., will be dumped down chutes into the basement, and the two floors of the building will be occupied by the starchers, mangle machines, etc., and there will be no offensive features about the place.

DEATH OF MRS. ELVIRA SMITH.—Mrs. Elvira Smith, widow of Almon Smith, died in this city yesterday, aged 65 years. She was born in 1854 at Syracuse, N. Y., and came to Oregon in 1872. Possessed of an amiable disposition and high character, she is mourned by a large circle. She was a devoted member of Calvary Presbyterian Church, and was one of the earliest members and earnest workers in Columbia Rebekah Degree Lodge, No. 3, Independent Order of Odd Fellows. Mrs. Smith is survived by three children: Mrs. C. E. Sears, of Whatcom, Wash.; Mrs. Willetta S. Hill, of Wawona, Cal., and Mrs. J. D. Honeyman, and E. L. Smith, of this city. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence of J. D. Honeyman, 200 St. Clair street.

MRS. EGERT TO LEAVE PORTLAND.—Mrs. Fredrick Egert will leave Portland on next Thursday for a three months' Eastern trip, during which she will visit among relatives and friends in several cities. As Pacific Coast representative and chairman of the advisory committee of the Woman's Congregational Home Missionary Union of 42 states and territories, Mrs. Egert will attend the annual Congregational Home Missionary Society, of which Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, D. D., is president, and which will meet in Syracuse, N. Y., in May or early in June. Mrs. Egert will be presiding officer at the women's meetings to be held in connection with this annual meeting, and will be in charge of all the programs.

ROSE CLUB'S PUBLIC MEETING.—At the Unitarian Chapel, Seventh and Yamhill streets, the Rose Club will hold, next Thursday night, at 8 o'clock, the first of a series of public meetings, with the object of awakening increased interest in rose culture among Portland flower-lovers. W. S. Sisson, the prominent rose grower, who has won many prizes with his fine roses, will address the meeting, and others who have had much experience in rose culture will be present. No admission will be charged, and all persons interested in making Portland a "rose city" are urged to attend.

PORTLAND BOYS MAKE DEBATING TEAM.—News has been received that two out of three places on the Stanford Freshman debating team have been made by Portland boys. They are Benjamin C. Dible and Arthur M. Dible, both High School graduates. The contest in which they will represent the club is the annual Freshman-Sophomore debate. Both Dible and Dible were prominent debaters in the High School. Dible being on the team that defeated the Willamette University last May.

GREAT IRRIGATION FIELD. Minnesota Man Prizes Deschutes Country—Disappointment at Delay.

Ex-Senator D. M. Sabin, of Minnesota, who has been spending a few days in Portland, left last night for San Francisco. Mrs. Sabin is with him. They will return to Portland next week, by which time Mr. Sabin hopes the delay in the execution of contracts for irrigation projects in the Deschutes country will have ended. He is one of the Minnesota capitalists interested in the Walker Basin reclamation enterprise. He is also somewhat interested in Oregon timber.

"I find almost as many Minnesota timber men in this country as I see in my own state," said Mr. Sabin last evening.

"You can't throw a stick in the street without hitting half a dozen of them." Just then a Duluth lumberman, with whom he had dealings, but whom he had never met, came up and introduced himself, and the two chatted a few minutes.

"That's the way I find 'em all over this country," said Mr. Sabin, as he turned to the reporter.

"This is a great timber country, and I am quite delighted with it in all respects. Mrs. Sabin is also charmed with the country and the people. We've got to get away for a few days and break the spell, or I fear we should not be able to leave Oregon long enough to get back home."

"Yes, there is a great field for reclamation in Eastern Oregon, and I think there is money to be made in legitimate irrigation works, both for the investors and for the people who settle on the land, and also for the state. I am a little disappointed at the delay that has occurred. Of course, it is to be expected of the authorities that they will proceed carefully to protect the public interests, but I regret to say that in the present instance they don't proceed at all. They do nothing and will not even tell us what to do that will meet their approval. I hope this condition will not continue long."
