SIMON MEN PUT UP

Many Bogus "Independent" Tickets Filed.

GENUINE LIST YET TO COME

Regular Organization Will Disclose Its Candidates Tuesday—Bona Fide Opposition Monday.

A number of "Independent" tickets were filed in the office of the County Clerk yesterday, as The Oregonian has said would be the case of these tickets, but a part of the plan outlined by which the Simon machine hopes to divert votes from the opposition ticket by confusing the voters with a mass of "Independent" delegates, apparently all in opposition to the machine, but really allied with the ticket to be named by the Republican County Central Committee at the suggestion of the dictation of Mr. Simon and his friends.

The Oregonian does not say that all the men named on the Independent tickets referred to are abettors or supporters of this machine plan to secure victory by indirection. Many of them are estimable citizens and of unquestioned integrity in public and private life. Any 10 voters of a precinct get together and file an independent ticket, and while the petitioners may be working for the machine, it might better suit their purpose to name as delegates electors of excellent reputation, for it is the method, and not the men, that is relied upon to aid the Simon cause.

But here is an illustration: "Independent" candidates were filed for precinct 8, in the Second Ward, in the persons of T. H. McAllister and Emmet Drake. Dr. Drake is a member of the advisory committee of the Republican County Central Committee, and is an avowed Simon man. The pretense that he is an "Independent" candidate is too transparent to require any further exposure than calling attention to that fact. Opposed to this "Independent" ticket and to the "regular" ticket yet to be named (or rather to be revealed) will be a genuine Independent list of candidates. Residents of precinct 8 have been circulating a petition for the nomination of Herbert Holman, manager of the Kellogg Transportation Company, and Dan J. Malarkey, the well-known attorney. The Oregonian was last night furnished a list of the freeholders of precinct 8 who have signed the Holman-Malarkey petition. A glance at the following will disclose that they are representative residents of the precinct. They are:

Publication in The Oregonian of the great Simon game of having on the primary ballot duplicate independent candidates in many precincts has made it very difficult to carry out the scheme. Nevertheless, in the several "Independent" lists of candidates already filed are to be found signatures of citizens who supposed that they were supporting a genuine anti-Simon movement, while others who are favorable to the "regular" nominees doubtless thought that they were simply aiding an innocent and proper plan to place Republicans in nomination.

It is understood that the tickets of the Independent Republicans will meet a week ago last Friday night in the A. O. U. W. Hall will be filed with the County Clerk Monday. Inasmuch as this is the only real opposition to the Simon machine, the fair and equitable way would be to call the tickets "Independent No. 1," which would indicate to the voters clearly that it was the ticket opposed to the nominees of the county central committee, which is controlled by Senator Simon. It is to avoid doing this very thing that other independent tickets are being filed in the County Clerk's office. It is the Simon plan to prevent the consecutive numbering of the real independent ticket in each precinct. For example, in the precincts for which tickets were filed yesterday, those first filed will be "No. 1." In other precincts for which the machine has not yet filed so-called independent tickets the real independent ticket will be "No. 1."

Therefore, in order for a voter to cast his ballot against the machine, it will be necessary for him to go carefully through the list of tickets in each precinct and select those corresponding in the smallest detail with the nominations of the real independent Republicans, which will be made public as soon as filed. Utmost caution will have to be observed to prevent this trick of machine politics being in a measure successful. The fallacy and absurdity of the tickets filed yesterday being genuinely independent is evidenced by the admission of Chairman Plummer, of the county central committee, yesterday that several of the persons named on the so-called independent tickets would be on the regular Republican lists, which will be suggested or dictated by Senator Simon and his friends.

Prospects in Ninth Ward.
The headquarters of the Ninth Ward Republican Club, at 25 Grand avenue, in

the Burkhard building, is kept open every night, and is thronged with Republicans from all over the East Side. This is the anti-Simon club for that portion of the city. There is much enthusiasm manifested among those who gather at the headquarters, and they claim that Simon will not carry a precinct in the Ninth Ward.

HOW THE MACHINE WORKS.

Pretty Job in the Polling Places for Precincts 48 and 60.
The Republican machine, in arranging the voting places in the county outside of the city limits, has done so in a manner best calculated to serve its purposes. The polling places, in nearly every instance, are so located as to compel many electors, if they desire to vote at the primaries, to travel long distances. It is presumed, of course, that the majority of people will not spare the time to make a long trip, and that, consequently, a small clique in each precinct can readily control things.

This scheme is plainly noticeable in the consolidation of precincts 48 and 60 into a joint district, with one polling place located at Sylvan. Precinct 68 extends to within about one mile of Linton, and Sylvan is situated in precinct 60, at the head of the Canyon road, and about 10

MONEY FOR WORKING

\$130,000 Sent by Eastern Owner of Iron Dyke.

BAKER COUNTY, OR., PROPERTY

His Representatives Go Over the Proposed Route for the Northwest Railroad, and Will Submit a Favorable Report.

BAKER CITY, March 8.—From F. E. Pearce, general manager of the Iron Dyke mine, who has just returned from an inspection of the mine and proposed route of the Northwest Railroad, it is learned that Lewis Rosenweig, who is the attorney for Charles M. Reed, the owner of both properties, brought \$130,000 in cash with him from the East to be used in the development of the mine. This money has been placed at the disposal of Mr. Pearce, who will direct the work of developing the mine.

Mr. Pearce and Mr. Rosenweig traveled over the proposed route of the Northwest Railroad and carefully inspected the grade that was constructed several years ago. They also made careful estimates of the cost of completing the grade, and through to the mine. They found that the route is practical and the road can be built for a very reasonable figure. The nature of the report to be made to Mr. Reed and his associates was not divulged, save to intimate that it would be favorable.

Mr. Reed is a director in several of the Vanderbilt enterprises in the East, besides being closely identified with the Harriman interests. This may not signify anything in particular, but it does not require very much of an effort to imagine that the Harriman syndicate will not interfere with the building of the Northwest Railroad by the people who are now back of the enterprise.

Machinery for Bonanza Hoist.
The machinery for the new hoist, now in course of construction at the Bonanza mine, is arriving in this city from the East. The engine is the largest of its kind ever brought to this section. The main shaft of the engine is 32 feet long and 12 inches diameter. With the crank wheels and eccentric attached, it made a full carload. The machinery is transferred to the Sumpter Valley Road and sent to Whitney. From there it is hauled by wagon to the mine. When the completion of this new hoist, the output of the Bonanza mine will be increased 50 to 100 per cent. No one knows just what the monthly clean-up of the mine is, but a gentleman who is able to make an estimate says it has never been less than \$50,000 per month for the past six months.

THE DEATH ROLL

Frank Conger, Founder of the American Bridge Company.

NEW YORK, March 8.—A telegram from Detroit today announced the sudden death of Frank Conger, of this city. Mr. Conger was taken ill last Monday with the grip, which later developed into pneumonia. Mr. Conger was born in 1849 at Groton, N. Y. He was president of two banks at Groton, until recently president of the Universal Safety Thread Company, of New Jersey; president of the American Visible Typewriter Company, of Delaware; president of the Conger Carriage Works and director of the Conger Manufacturing Company and the Conger Press Company, of Groton. He was prominent in New York, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia clubs. Mr. Conger was the originator of the American Bridge Company, a concern that did a business of \$2,000,000 annually previous to its absorption by the United States Steel Corporation.

Ex-Fire Chief of St. Louis.
ST. LOUIS, March 8.—J. Lindquist, ex-Chief of the Fire Department of St. Louis, died today after a long illness. Mr. Lindquist was a member of the fire department for more than 20 years previous to 1896.

Uriel H. Crocker.
BOSTON, March 8.—Uriel H. Crocker, author of several standard books on legal subjects, died at his home here today, aged 69 years. He was prominent in charitable work today after a long illness, and a member of various patriotic and social organizations.

SNOWSLIDE VICTIMS.

Two More Bodies Recovered at the Liberty Bell Mine, Telluride.

TELLURIDE, Colo., March 8.—Business was suspended here today during the funerals of George Rohrer and W. S. Gregory, prominent citizens who sacrificed their lives in a snowslide when trying to rescue the men who were buried under a slide at the Liberty Bell mine Friday, February 28.

A party of 125 men was at work today searching for the bodies of Swanson and Aho, two men who were killed in trying to rescue others, were recovered. All the victims of the second, third and fourth slides have now been recovered, leaving only the bodies buried at the Liberty Bell mine to be searched for.

All anxiety for the seven miners employed at the Andrews mine in Ingram Basin, was dispelled this morning when three men came to Telluride. They report having had a narrow escape, snow-buried coming down on either side and barely missing the cabin they occupied.

Nothing has been heard from the force of half a dozen men working in Bridal Veil Basin. If no news of them comes within a day or two, a searching party will be formed to find them.

Taxation in Kentucky.

FRANKFORT, Ky., March 8.—The lower house of the Assembly today struck out the revenue bill all proposed increase of the rate of taxation of life insurance companies doing business in Kentucky, allowing the present law to stand. The House adopted a resolution increasing an annual tax of one-tenth of 1 per cent on capital stock of corporations doing business in Kentucky which have organized in other states. It reaches the corporations operating out of Kentucky, to secure the protection of the Federal courts.

Southern Education.
NEW YORK, March 8.—Announcement is made that there has been formed in this city an organization to promote Southern education, to be known as the General Education Board, and that more than \$1,000,000 has been placed at the disposal of the Board of Trustees. The association will seek gifts, large and small, from those in sympathy with its plans.

GRIFFIN STATES HIS PRICE.

Exhibits a Check for \$1000 From the Simon Machine.

"W. D. Griffin, editor of the New Age, showed me a check for \$1000 today, and said that he received it from United States Senator Joseph Simon in return for the support of his paper and his influence among the colored voters of Portland."

Statement made by Gus Waterford, a well-known colored leader.
Griffin is prominent in certain Afro-American circles of the city, and it has been known for some time that he is expected to deliver the colored vote to the Simon machine. Griffin's statement that he was to receive for this support and for the editorial endorsement in his paper of the Simon machine was not known previously. As an illustration of the methods of the Boss Waterford's statement that he saw the check and was told that it came from Simon is interesting. It will explain why so many campaign sheets are thriving and are being issued regularly with columns of praise for Simon and his machine, and vilification and abuse for citizens who are fighting Simon in the interest of good government and a clean, honest administration.

SERVING PRIMARY NOTICES.

Deputy Sheriffs Notify Judges and Clerks of the Day for Voting.

The new primary and election laws place numerous duties upon the county officers. The County Clerk is required to notify each judge and clerk of his appointment and receive his return of acceptance, and 700 of such notices had to be made out and mailed. Besides, another notice that a primary election is to be held at a certain time must be served on each judge and clerk of election by the Sheriff, and deputies are now in the field performing this service. They received the first batch of notices yesterday, of which there will be about 600, covering all parts of the city. It will rush the deputies to get through, and they will probably have to put in extra time tonight. The Sheriff the day before election also has to deliver election supplies to 57 different precincts, and the booths have to be put up during the week.

SEVENTH WARD REPUBLICANS.

Seventh Ward Republicans met in adjourned meeting last night, in Hobkirk Hall, but refused to take up the matter of endorsement of candidates for election at the primaries, holding that it was a matter pertaining to the individual precincts. As there was no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Readers Cattle Immune.

BERLIN, March 8.—At a session of the budget committee of the Prussian Diet, Privy Councillor Kirchener made the important announcement that a sure means had been discovered to render cattle immune from the foot and mouth disease. He added that it was justifiable to assume that preparations would shortly be available whereby individuals could immunize their stock comparatively cheap. Professor Löffler, who had conducted the experiments to this successful end, had tested the bacillus remedy and had found it efficacious.

Minnesota Taxation Measures.

ST. PAUL, March 8.—After defeating several proposed taxation measures, the conference committee of the two houses of the Legislature today reported a compromise on what is known as the constitutional amendment bill. A tax on franchises or on gross earnings of corporations, at the option of the Legislature; a tax on the income of credits not to exceed 10 per cent, and a general income tax on incomes exceeding \$1000, are the principal changes over existing statutes. The conference report was adopted by the Senate.

FROST FOR SIMON MEN.

Few Attend a "Mass" Meeting at Gomez Hall.

After advertising for three days that there would be a meeting last evening in Gomez Hall, for the purpose of selecting delegates to be voted for at the primaries, some 40 people responded to the call. Many of them were Simon office holders.

An attempt was made to put up an "Independent" ticket in the interest of Simon, but it failed, owing to The Oregonian's exposure of the trick.
