

DOG SHOW IS AT AN END

EVENT IN ALL RESPECTS MOST SUCCESSFUL EVER HELD HERE.

Large Crowds Take Final Look at Animals—Award of Many Special Prizes.

The third annual bench show of the Portland Kennel Club was brought to a successful termination last evening. It being generally pronounced the best exhibition of its kind ever held on the Pacific Coast. All day yesterday, and until a late hour in the evening, crowds swarmed in and out of the big hall. During all the time the barking and howling of the favorites sounded like the musketry of battle. Many dog fanciers went yesterday to take their last farewell peep at the beauties, while others were present for the first time. Among the visitors were G. M. Curran and A. P. Vreeland, both of New York City. These gentlemen are noted dog fanciers, and are traveling over the Pacific States in the interests of the American Kennel Club. They pronounced the local show one of the finest that they had ever seen. As usual, Oregon's Jessie II, the prize bitch, from Pendleton, was admired by many who passed her kennel. F. P. Wamsley, her owner, was at the show yesterday, and was as proud as a boy with a new pair of red-top boots. "Jessie," as she is commonly known, is a beautiful animal that can win honors at any bench show.

All the special cups and trophy prizes were distributed last evening, and a number of delayed special prizes were awarded the prize cup for the best decorated kennel, was won by Walter B. Honeman, the second going to Miss Leone Griffin. J. T. Blight received \$25 for handling the largest string of dogs from California, and Frank Turner got a similar amount for having the largest string from British Columbia. George Tinto took a \$25 prize for having the largest string from the State of Washington. G. M. Brown and W. H. Laughton, of this city, and Thomas Carmichael of Gaston, Or., won the Nalra medals for the best collie puppies. The cocker puppy was drawn by Miss Lulu Curry, 161 North Eighteenth street, and the collie, by Mrs. H. S. Hendrickson, 110 North Seventeenth street.

From start to finish, the show was a success. Financially, it is the best thing of the kind ever held in the Northwest, the dog-lovers and general public of Portland being especially liberal in their patronage. The judging was done by an expert, and his decisions have been taken without question, in every instance. Mr. Mammell believes that the dogs of the local show—especially the pointers, setters, and cockers—can hold their own anywhere in the East or England. He says that Oregon's Jessie II is one of the finest animals he ever saw, and that there were numerous other good ones in the show just closed. Many of the local dogs were taken to their homes last evening.

WEST SIDE SURVEY DONE

Insurance Men Will Now Begin on East Side.

The fire insurance surveyors, who are making new rates for the city, yesterday finished the West Side of the river, with the exception of a few special hazards. Three last will be completed within two or three days, and work will then begin on the survey of the East Side. Insurance agents have received almost all of their minimum-rate cards for the West Side. In the business part of the city and on the water front, the new rates will average about the same as the old. The rates have been raised on some public buildings, but this has been compensated for by lower rates on others. In the residence part of the city there has been an appreciable reduction. The surveyors have been met with many inquiries as to how much reduction on the water front a fireboat would effect. They have no authority to answer on this score, because their duty is simply to survey and assess rates according to the schedule of the Underwriters of the Pacific. All inquiries on this subject have been referred to A. E. Stillman, secretary of the Pacific Board. Mr. Stillman some time ago said that a fireboat would effect a saving in insurance, but failed to state
