METLAKO BLOWS OUT A CYLINDER HEAD.

One Passenger's Leg Is Broken-Aceldent Is Caused by a Broken Crank Pin.

The steamer Metlako suffered an accifient yesterday, which will lay her up for repairs until a new steam cylinder is made. The crank pin on the starboard side of the wheel, broke, and the piston head and rod was driven through the end of the cylinder. A passenger named Hall suffered a broken and burned leg. He is now at the North Pacific Sanitarium.

The Metlako is operated by the White Collar line between this city and The Dalles. The company has engaged the steamer Albany to take the place of the abled boat, so that there will be no

The Metlako started from Portland at her usual hour yesterday morning. She had proceeded a few miles above Vancouwer, when the mishap occurred. So great was the impact of the piston rod against the head of the cylinder, that the entire end of the cylinder was blown off and broken to pieces. Mr. Hall was coming out of the washroom, whose door was only about three feet from the cylinder. The strange part of the accident was that he did not receive more serious injuries. Chief Engineer Art Andrews and his as-sistant, Charles Burt, were in the engine-room. Mr. Burt immediately shut off the ateam. As the cloud of steam cleared away. Mr. Hall was seen on the floor, as much ease as the situation afforded, and when the boat arrived at Portland, two hours later, he was taken to the

In a few minutes after the mishap, the disabled cylinder was disconnected and the steamer returned under one engine. The Metiako was formerly the steame Bonita, although when she assumed her present name she received improvements thich made her practically a new boat,
