

OVER TWENTY THOUSAND

TOTAL REGISTRATION FOR MULTNOMAH COUNTY.

Increase in Two Years of 1648—City Figures Show Increase of 1848.

The completed registration figures prepared by County Clerk Swatland show that the total registration in Multnomah County is 20,380, as compared to 18,740 in the year 1900, an increase of 1648. The registration in the city of Portland is 17,636, and in 1900 it was 16,588. The increase in the city is 1048.

The largest number registered is in Precinct 8, which has 671 votes. In Precinct 8 there are 401 registered; precinct 4, 392, and Precinct 17, 339. The smallest number registered in the city is Precinct 20, which has 107 electors.

There are over 300 registered in each of several outside precincts. Registration figures for the precincts are as follows:

LOW RATES FOR PUPILS.

City & Suburban to Sell 33 Tickets for One Dollar.

The City & Suburban Railway announces that it will sell 33 one-fare tickets for \$1 to school children as soon as it can make preliminary arrangements. The Portland Railway Company has been doing this for about four years. The following is the announcement of the City & Suburban Railway made by C. F. Swigert, secretary and treasurer:

"This company has decided to sell to actually enrolled pupils of the public school books containing 33 tickets for \$1. These tickets to be good only upon school days, between the hours of 7:30 A. M. and 5 P. M., with such other limitations as may seem necessary to confine their use to the purposes intended. This rate will be put in effect as soon as the necessary tickets have been procured, but, owing to the fact that the schools will close in about three weeks, it is quite probable that it is too late for this term."

"Seattle and Tacoma are the only cities giving a 25-cent fare to all school children, and in these towns the conditions of use are strictly limited. In Spokane they are sold to children under 14 years of age, and in Denver to children under 12 years. In Omaha, Kansas City and Terre Haute, all cities about the size of Portland, no concession whatever is given."

The following letter from the company that owns the street railways of Spokane shows how the low fare arrangement works in that city:

"The tickets are not issued in the summer season, when the schools are closed, and are only issued to those who are under 14 years of age. When first started this system we did not allow them to be used except on school days and during school hours. Now we accept them at all times. We also found it necessary to keep a register of children's names and ages, in order to protect ourselves from under-statement of age, as we found that children using school tickets had a very persistent habit of remaining in the 14 years old for several years after they had passed it. We are not altogether sure of the wisdom of extending the use of these tickets beyond school days and school hours, but such a limitation complicates the use of the ticket and makes more or less trouble."

The conditions under which the tickets will be issued by the City & Suburban Company are the same as those of the Portland Railway Company.

NEWS OF THE COURTS.

Dr. Drake Tells How He Crowned a Tooth—Other Matters.

Dr. W. S. Drake, in answer to the suit of A. J. Delano for \$150 damages, denies that he unskillfully fixed Delano's teeth, and denies that he has sustained any damages on that account whatever. He says that Delano came to him and requested him to crown his two central upper incisors, and he (Drake) informed him that in order properly to do the work it would be necessary to treat the right upper central incisor for several months before placing the crown thereon, as the tooth was in such a condition of decay that it would not be safe to crown it without the treatment. Dr. Drake asserts that Delano informed him, in response to this information, that he desired crowns placed upon the teeth at once, and would assume all responsibility. Dr. Drake states that he accordingly undertook to crown the left and right upper central incisors, and did so in accordance with approved principles of dentistry, and in a good, workmanlike manner, and that any suffering or sloughing off of the gums or loosening of the teeth which Delano sustained is due to his own acts and negligence.

Incorporations.

Articles of Incorporation of the Pacific Railway Amusement Company were filed in the County Clerk's office yesterday by George W. Simpson, Herman Mueller and Frank Fenwick, capital stock, \$3000. The objects announced are to manufacture, buy, sell and operate miniature locomotives, cars, rails, bridges, tunnels and any like article or appliances of amusement or pleasure.

Construction Company were filed yesterday by Fred S. Morris, George L. Brown and William T. Muir, capital stock, \$10,000. The objects are to build, construct and to contract for building telegraph, telephone or electrical lines, railroads, etc.

The estate is valued at about \$500, and is distributed as follows: To Harriet Ann Smith, the widow, \$500; to be realized from an insurance policy, subject to the payment of a mortgage for \$500 on a house and lots at Highland. To Benjamin Franklin Smith, a son, \$100. The rest and residue of the estate is bequeathed in equal shares to the children, Emory Howard Smith, Benjamin F. Smith, William Christian Smith and Minnie Caprice Smith. A. P. Fiegl and W. N. Jones are named as executors.

Henry McDonald pleaded guilty in the United States District Court yesterday to a charge of selling alcoholic liquor to an Indian, and was sentenced by Judge Bellinger to serve 90 days in the County Jail at Pendleton, and was also fined \$100.

Emil Beck pleaded guilty before Judge Bellinger yesterday to a charge of selling whisky to an Indian, and was sentenced to serve a term of two months in the Multnomah County Jail, and was also fined \$100.

GOOD TIMES FOR BOISE.

Thunder Mountain Development Helpful to Idaho.

W. J. D'Arcy, business manager and one of the proprietors of the Boise Evening News, left last evening for his home in Boise, Idaho, after spending a few days in Portland and Salem. Mr. D'Arcy says that business conditions in Idaho are excellent, and that he expects to see that section of the country undergo greater development in the next three years than ever before in its history. A new Federal building is being erected at Boise, and a number of modern business blocks are being constructed, while others are being planned.

The people of Boise are just now very much interested in the Thunder Mountain mining district, and the business men are planning to capture a large part of the trade that will result from the development of the mines. Plans are now making for the construction of a wagon road from Boise to Thunder Mountain by way of either Idaho City or Placerville. Whether the road will be built depends upon the results of this summer's work in the mines.

The men who are now interested in the Thunder Mountain region are principally Pittsburgh capitalists. While no information is given out by the owners of the Duway mine, which is in operation, it is the general belief that the mine is very rich. It is expected that many other gold deposits not now known will be found in the neighborhood of the Thunder Mountain country, and that this section of Idaho will excel in richness the Cripple Creek country, in Colorado. Three townships have already been laid out, and town lots are being sold. Mr. D'Arcy expects that from 25,000 to 50,000 people will go to Thunder Mountain this summer.

Travel will begin in about three weeks, when the snow will be off the trails. Those who have already gone in went on snowshoes. One man has started for Thunder Mountain with 43 pack horses, loaded with foodstuffs, and he hopes to be able to get over the trails now.
