BUTTE, Mont., June 14.—Butte pounded Enrie all over the lot today, and won the game in the third inning by a score of 9 to 2. The Portland pitcher was easy for the Miners, and the hit him when they pleased, making a total of 16 hits. Vigneux was back in the game, and the team was the strongest the visitors could put in the field, but Butte was slugging, and there was no way to stop them. Burns, for Butte, pitched championship ball, and only in one inning did he allow the Webs anything but four scattered hits. In the eighth he seemed to go up in the air, and gave two bases on balls, and two singles brought in the only runs made by Portland.

The game started off well, and up to the third not a man saw beyond second. Houts, who got a double, being the only Miner to get a hit. Portland for three innings sent but three men to the bat in an inning, and the game promised to be a close one, but in the third the Miners got after Enrie, and singles by Ward, McIntyre and Burns, and a triple by Marshall scored five runs, Vigneux's passed ball being responsible for one of them, and errors by Mahaffey and Deisel for another. Butte scored in the seventh on three singles and two errors by Vigneux and Harris, and four runs resulted.

Portland scored in the eighth on singles by Vigneux and Van Buren, and two bases on balls given by Burns. The inning ended with two "Webs" on base.

Burns pulled himself out of a hole in the ninth, when he struck out Deisel with three men on base. The game was rather tame, and there were few features, aside from the stickwork of Butte, Burns' pitching and the magnificent running chance of a foul against the right field fence, by Ward, who stopped Burns' chances to score in the ninth. Portland played a fairly good game in the field, and the outfield especially was strong. The fielders had plenty of work to do, for both pitchers kept the big in the air.
