CELEBRATE THEIR FIFTY-FIFTH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY



ALBANY, Or., June 14.—Mr. and Mrs. Drury R. Hodges celebrated the 55th anniversary of their wedding April 27. Mr. Hodges was born in Shelby County, Indiana, in 1822. Mahala V. Hodges, nee Fickel, was born in La Fayette County, Missouri, in 1829. They were married in Platte County, Missouri, April 27, 1847, and soon after marriage started across the plains with an ox team for Oregon, in Captain Bond's company. The young couple, 22 and 18 years, respectively, shared each other's pleasures and hardships equally, handling the ox whip alternately for five months before they reached the Willamette Valley. They located on a donation claim five miles north of Albany, in Benton County, where they built up a fine farm, and continued to reside until a few years ago, when they gave up active labor and moved three miles distant to the village of Wells. Eleven children have been born to them, nine of whom are still living, four sons and five daughters—Robert, Commodore, A. J. and Marcus, Mrs. Kate Vanderpool, Mrs. Emma Hewie, Mrs. Caroline Holman, residing in Oregon, and Mrs. Georgia Davis and Mrs. Florence Reed, of Washington. Mr. and Mrs. Hodges are mentally as clear now as they were 40 years ago.
