LOOKS BAD FOR GLADISEE

CORONER'S VERDICT IN BORGUS CASE IS AGAINST HIM.

Startling Testimony of Mrs. Eames, Who Saw the Murder, But in Vision Only.

Testimony taken from various sources yesterday tended materially to strengthen the charge made against T. Gladisee, a colored man, for having murdered Louis Borgus.

The verdict rendered at the coroner's inquest confirmed the statements already published as to Louis Borgus' age, nativity, occupation, etc., and stated further that the cause of the death was a fracture of the skull at the base, and hemorrhage of the brain, caused from this injury.

That it appears from the evidence and all the circumstances that said injury and fracture of the skull was produced by some person or persons with intent to rob the deceased.

The first witness called was Grover Sundt, who lives at 221 East Eighth street, and works at the Willamette Iron Works.

He called some of his friends and showed them the body, and, on attempting to raise him, it was found that he was dead.

"This was too much for the colored lady, and she gave her questioner a haughty stare. 'What,' said she, 'me down in that part of town at night? What I am telling you is a vision that I saw just as plain as if it had been real, and if you just get a Chicago Pinkerton man he'll find out that them same two niggers did the killing. I'm sure of it.'"

"Is your vision, you know of the case?" she was asked.

"Yes; but that's enough. If you only had the right sort of detectives you would find that I am right."

The woman who asked a few more questions and dismissed.

The detective says that various information has been picked up during the day that makes him believe they have arrested the right man; but that they do not wish to make their knowledge public at present.

Andrew Jackson and Ed Johnson (both colored) have been detained as witnesses, and are expected to give some valuable information.
