THIEVES MAKE A HAUL

BREAK INTO FOUR BUILDINGS AND STEAL \$200. Two Saloons Are Robbed of Money and Liquor—Two Residences Are Also Broken Into.

Scientific burglars entered four buildings Friday and yesterday and reaped a harvest of \$200 in liquor and money. About 4 o'clock entrance was effected into the Boss saloon, on the corner of Front and Flanders streets, and the till was relieved of \$25. The burglars made their way through the gasboiler, and they made no attempt to break through the door which led to the barroom, and where a few hundreds were stored in the register.

The saloon of Sam Waffler, on Alder street, near Sixth, was robbed early yesterday morning. A rear window was broken, and the thieves broke a nickel-in-the-slot machine and obtained about \$25 in booty.

George P. Wells, of Seventh and Jefferson streets, reported to the police that his house had been entered, and that \$10 had been stolen out of his trousers pocket. Mr. Wells said that the burglar had cut the wire screen and entered through a door which had been evidently left unlocked.
