LONDON'S POOR FED

King Edward's Dinner to the Slum Dwellers.

HALF A MILLION MADE HAPPY

Talk of Bringing Off the Coronation in the Fall-Royal Physicians Report Their Patient Out of Danger.

LONDON, July 5.—Half a million of London's slum-dwellers were King Edward's guests this afternoon. They were seated in about 400 halls, schools and parks in varying numbers, the greater number of beneficiaries being at Stepney, where no fewer than 65,000 enjoyed a dinner such as they seldom partook of. At every gathering was read a message from the King, signed by his private secretary, to the poor, sent through the Lord Mayor of London. This morning's bulletin-announcing that King Edward is out of danger was also circulated to the 265,000 people drank His Majesty's health in unrestrained enjoyment out of the coronation cups presented to each of them as a souvenir of the occasion. The tidings that His Majesty was out of danger.

On his arrival at York House this evening, after a long tour of the many dining rendezvous, the Prince of Wales, accompanied by the Lord Mayor of London, Sir Joseph C. Dimdale, that the programme was everywhere carried out without a hitch. The Prince in this dispatch commended all the Mayors and all the others concerned for the excellence of the arrangements for the dinner, and thanked the people for the hearty welcome accorded himself and the Princess. Sir Thomas Lister, who presided at the dinner, has transmitted his thanks to all responsible for organizing the feasts for their painstaking devotion in carrying out the wishes of His Majesty.

The appearance of Queen Alexandra, as she drove out in an open carriage for an hour this evening, accompanied by some of the royal guests, at the palace, occasioned much enthusiasm on the part of the streets which Her Majesty traversed.

The following bulletin regarding King Edward's condition was posted at Buckingham Palace at 10 o'clock this morning: "His Majesty had another excellent night, and he is cheerful and feels much stronger. We are able to state that we consider the King now out of danger. The evening bulletins will therefore be discontinued." — Treves, Laking, Barlow.

A number of coronation rumors are current. The optimistic say King Edward will be quietly crowned six weeks hence. Rear-Admiral John C. Watson, who was to have represented the United States at the coronation of King Edward, will return home, however, July 12, and hopes to come back for the ceremony, the date of which he is unable to prognosticate. The court authorities have been showing the business world with the view of ascertaining public interests prior to making any definite arrangements. The proprietor of the Standard Oil Company has been asked to obtain a license which it sought from the Indian Government.

Standard Oil in Burmah. LONDON, July 5.—Replying to a question of Andrew Bonar Law, M. P. (Conservative), as to whether he could ally the anxiety of investors in the old fields of Burmah by giving an assurance that the Standard Oil Company, whose representatives were seeking to obtain government concessions for oil lands, would not be permitted to obtain a footing in those fields, Lord George Hamilton, the Secretary of State for India, says he has ascertained that the Standard Oil Company has not obtained the prospecting license which it sought from the Indian Government.

Redmond Calls on Irish to Resist. LONDON, July 5.—Addressing a meeting of the United Irish League at Limerick this afternoon, John Redmond, chairman of the league, called on the Irish to unite for one great effort. Coercion, he said, should meet coercion, and the land schemes of Mr. Wyndham, the Chief Secretary for Ireland, who was one of the worst representatives of English rule ever sent to Ireland, should be defeated. It rested with the Irish to win their liberty.

Queen's Message to the President. WASHINGTON, July 5.—The President has received the following cablegram from Queen Alexandra: "The President of the United States, D. C.: The King is most grateful for kind sympathy. He is, thank God, getting on very favorably now. ALEXANDRA."

THE PINS CLAIM. Names Suggested for Board of Arbitration. ROME, July 5.—In view of the possibility of the Holy international Tribunal reporting that arbitrator, the neutral country to be chosen to settle the question between the United States and France, Count Torrelli, the President of the Senate, Signor Saracco; the President of the Chamber, Signor Biancheri, and Senators Villari, Pagano, and Visconti Venosta. The letter was sent to King Emmanuel to study the Anglo-Italian dispute regarding the boundary of British Guiana, in which His Majesty is arbitrator.

The Pius claim, amounting to about \$3,000,000, has been pending for about a third of a century. It involves a dispute between the Catholic church of California and the Government of Mexico, as to the liability of the latter for the interest on certain church lands which the Mexican Government undertook to hold as trustee for the church.

TROUBLE FOR THE PORTE. Bulgaria and France Demand Satisfaction for Injuries. CONSTANTINOPLE, July 5.—Turco-Bulgarian complications are threatened as consequence of the forcible removal of the flag and coat of arms from the Bulgarian agency at Serez, Humelia. Bulgaria has demanded satisfaction within three days. A detachment of Turkish troops recently surrounded a band of Bulgarian brigands at Pateli, in the vilayet of Monastir. Thirty Bulgarians were killed. The remainder were made prisoners. Brigandage is spreading alarmingly in Monastir.

VIENNA, July 5.—It is reported here that France has threatened to send an ultimatum to Turkey because the Porte

has failed to apologize for the action of Turkish policemen at Smyrna in boarding a French ship to arrest Turkish spy who had taken refuge on board the vessel.

TRIP THROUGH PERSIA.

Minister and Mrs. Griscom Finish a 1000-Mile Trip. LONDON, July 5.—Private advices from Teheran, Persia, under date of June 13, announce the return of Lloyd Griscom, the United States Minister to Persia, and Mrs. Griscom from a 1000-mile ride on horseback through Central and West-Central Persia. The trip was taken to secure information with the view of building up American commerce in Persia. The great Persian trade routes, the Karun River and the old highway from Teheran to Bagdad, were closely investigated.

The Rhodes Scholarships. LONDON, July 5.—An unfortunate hitch has occurred in the arrangements regarding the Cecil Rhodes scholarships, owing to the illness of Lord Grey, who suffered a slight sunstroke in the Channel Islands this week. Serious complications were feared at first, but Lord Grey will be well enough July 8 to go to the Continent, though perfect rest is enjoined. Lord

Fast Time on Alton. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 5.—All records for fast time on the Chicago & Alton Railroad have been broken by Lake Shore engine No. 66, which has been undergoing a test on the Alton with the engines from other roads. The Lake Shore engine brought 12 heavy coaches from Rockwood to Springwood, 110 miles, in 143 minutes, making three stops. The schedule time for the run with an ordinary train of four cars is 159 minutes. Many miles were made in 30 seconds extra. From Petersburg to Nason City, 15 miles, the run was made in 15 minutes.

No Scarcity of Armor-Plates. WASHINGTON, July 5.—The armor-makers appear to be keeping up a steady pace alongside of ship construction. Today the Navy Department was informed that the first consignment of armor for the new battleship Nebraska had been shipped. It was learned that the armor-makers are turning out their product at the rate of 10,000 tons a year, with the expectation of considerably increasing this rate, so that there appears to be no prospect for complaints on the score of non-delivery of this protective material.

Belgian Bank Not Affected. PARIS, July 5.—A director of the Belgian Bank, referred to by the Daily Chronicle of London as having failed for \$10,000,000, as the result of advances made to the Humberts, who are now fugitives from justice on account of their alleged swindling operations, denies the report of the failure, and says the bank was not connected with the Humbert loans.

Cuban Customs Receipts. HAVANA, July 5.—The customs receipts for Cuba for the month of June amounted to \$1,232,252.
