

TO REBUILD IRON WORKS

PHOENIX COMPANY BUYS BLOCK ON EAST THIRD AND CLAY.

A Machine- and Boiler-House, a Foundry and Pattern Shop Will Replace Those Destroyed.

The Phoenix Iron Works yesterday purchased the half block on East Third street, between East Clay street and Hawthorne avenue, and will proceed at once with the erection of buildings suitable for machine shops.

WILL BURN RED FIRE.

Albina Board of Trade Will Illuminate Abrams & Knox Tract. At a meeting of the Central Albina Board of Trade Friday night, held in the Mississippi-avenue engine-house, it was decided to illuminate the Abrams & Knox tract tomorrow night with red fire, so as to attract attention to its advantages as a possible site for the 1905 Fair.

Whereas, We believe it to be wrong in principle and practice to ruin the City Park for this purpose; and

Whereas, The Abrams & Knox tract of ground, supplemented by the Cook tract, situated on the elevated banks of the Willamette River, furnishes an ideal site for a successful fair, fulfilling all the requirements of the most judicious critics, therefore, be it

Resolved, That, in our judgment, any site for said fair other than the Peninsula means failure.
