

SCALP RUN KEEPS UP

Another Appropriation Will Be Asked For.

COST OF COYOTES ON OREGON

Appropriation of \$50,000 Used in Fourteen Months, With \$18,000 in Claims on File—Counties May Call a Halt.

Oregon counties, for the last year, have been paying out nearly \$500 for scalps of wild animals, principally coyotes. The county stands one-third of this amount, and the state two-thirds.

SALEM, July 12.—The appropriation of \$50,000 made by the last Legislature for the payment of scalp bounties has been exhausted, and additional claims aggregating \$13,960 have been audited and allowed.

Only Amount Paid by State. The sum last mentioned is only the amount that will be paid out by the state.

The act of 1901 provided for the payment of the bounty, but did not place any limit on the expenditure for this purpose. An appropriation of \$50,000 was made for the purpose of paying the claims, but no provision was made that the state should not be liable for the payment of a greater amount.

Another Appropriation Desired. Friends of the scalp bounty law will ask the next Legislature to appropriate some \$7,500 to pay the deficiency in the scalp bounty account.

Not Certain of Reimbursement. The counties paying the bounty claims now do so without any certainty of reimbursement.

THEIR UPS AND DOWNS IN GOOD YEARS AND BAD.

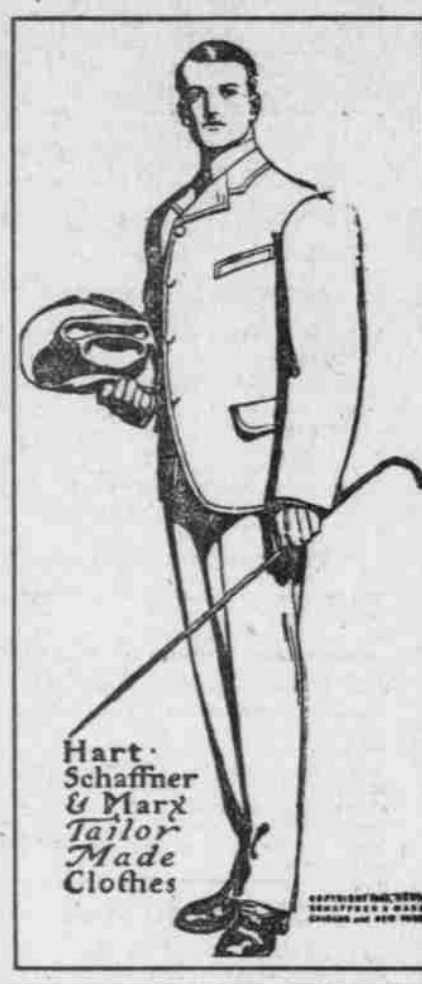
