The apparatus necessary for collecting and arranging these winged beauties is the simplest, consisting of a few articles. The first thing is the means of capturing. Capturing is not done by hand, but by means of a net, which can be made from a small hoop attached to the end of an old broom handle. The body of the net is made of mosquito netting, and should be about two feet deep if the hoop is a foot in diameter. With a little practice, one can become skillful in handling the net, and may catch butterflies rapidly and without in any way injuring their

delicate wings. In approaching the insect, it is well to wait until it has alighted, and to bring the net close to it, as slowly as possible, and keep ti near the ground and out of sight. When very close to the prey, a sudden movement will hag the butterfly and fold the net over so that it cannot escape. Never touch the wings with the fingers in removing the insect. Carefully insert the killing bottle and allow the butterfly to flutter into the bottle, and the insertio of the cork will hold it a prisoner,
