CHARGED WITH EMBROIDERY.—A. J. He says that he can procure the money as soon as he can get a word to certain of his friends, and it is thought that the prosecution will be dropped as soon as he pays the amount due. SHARING AN SHANIKO.—J. J. Wiley, proprietor of the Shaniko sheep-shearing pens, is in the city undergoing treatment for a damaged eye, the result of the explosion of a bottle. Shearing ended at Shaniko early a month ago, and the shears for the season's work are something startling in their magnitude. At his shearing pens Mr. Wiley handled between 100 and 150,000 sheep a week, and the new town will again make good her claim as the greatest primary wool market in the world, the season having reached a point where it is certain that at least 6,000,000 pounds of wool will be handled at this one point.
