GIRLS PUSH OVER & FENCE .- Five feet of the stone fence enclosing that portion of the City Hall at Madison and Fifth streets was broken down by hoodiums Friday night, and now lies on the cement walk below the street level. The uprights were shattered by contact with the concrete, and portions of the rail were chipped. When the wreck was discovered yesterday morning, it was thought that it was due to boys who had been playing in the neighborhood, and who knew that the fence, owing to the decay of the cement, was loose. Later, however, City Auditor Devin received a telephone message stating that the dam. age was done by girls, whose ages range from 15 to 17 years. His informant said that he was passing up Madison street about 10 o'clock Friday night, and he had seen four girls making a vigorous effort to push the fence over. When it fell, he said, the girls ran away. He furnished a good description of the girls, but he de-clined to give his name, as he said he did not wish to be detained as a witness. The information furnished by the man will be followed by the city authorities and an effort will be made to discover who the miscreants are.

WEARS & SUIT OF OREGON WOOL .- The first suit of clothes made from cloth pro-duced by the Sellwood Woolen Mills has been presented to C. H. McIsaac, secre-tary of the Manufacturers' Association, by Charles Coopey, the agent for the mills. The presentation was made in recognition of the interest which Mr. Mc-Issanc took in the mills from the time the project was first mentioned until capital was secured, the buildings crected and the machinery installed. It was suggested to Mr. Mclesac that he preserve the suit as a memento of the work he had done in behalf of the mill, but he was of the opinion that it should be put to the use for which it was intended, and so he made his first appearance in it yesterday.
