Poor Game of Baseball Won by Tacoma, 6 to 3.

CUNNINGHAM HAS NO CONTROL

Pitcher Retires in Second Inning, Too Late for Home Run to Pull Out—Umpire Colgan's Poor Work.

Yesterday's ball game was about the fiercest apology for professional baseball playing that has ever been seen here. The Elks and Eagles could not get up a better class of ball. The whole contest looked like an aftermath of the amateur night at Shields' Park. The playing by both teams was something awful, and the work of Umpire Colgan—well, it was worse than awful. Tacoma won the "game"—score 6 to 3. But that is not the reason the umpire is thought to have been off. He was just as hard on one team as the other.

Cunningham had his first trial yesterday, and while the result came far from a success, the umpire showed that he had the stuff in him. The first try-out lasted but a little over an inning, and in that time 10 men faced him. He had little control, and did not seem able to get the ball over the plate; so, after he had forced in a run, he gave up his position in the box to Werner and went to the bench. His appearance made a big hit with the crowd and the grandstand and bleachers broke into one cheer as he took his position in the box. The fact that he had to retire did not seem to shake the confidence the fans had in him, and all are sure that he will do better next time.

Just where Umpire Colgan got the reputation of being a good umpire is hard to understand. All week he has been more or less off on balls and strikes, and also on base decisions. But yesterday he was right. Some of the balls he called on Cunningham were fierce, and when he called Van Buren out at second in the first, when the man was easily safe, Mr. Colgan found out just what the crowd thought of him. The hissing and jeering that Mullane received was not to be compared with what Colgan got as he came in to take his place in the second inning. In the third he called Van Buren safe on first when Muller was on third, and Van was dead out. Muller scored Portland's first run—a direct gift from the umpire.

Neither team seemed to have any life in it. The boys played as if they cared not who won, and were there to get through nine innings on any kind of ball, just so that the spectators would get some sort of a run for their money. The only distinctive fielding feature was a double play unassisted by Anderson, and much of the glory of that is taken away, considering the easy chance. Andrews' fly came right to him, and some stupid base running by Smith allowed him to be caught off second. The plays were listless and absolutely without ginger. Balls were juggled and thrown all over the lot, and flies were misjudged.

Letcher was the first man up for Tacoma. He rapped an easy ball to Deisel, who juggled the ball. Nagle tried hard to sacrifice, and it was then that Cunningham showed some clever headwork. Nagle had two strikes, but still persisted in bunting. His third bunt went up in the air and came down between the plate and third. Ziegler was running up to field the ball, but Cunningham motioned him back, and let the ball hit the ground and roll off. This put Nagle out, and made Letcher return to first. Smith and Hutchinson walked to first on some wild balls by Cunningham, and some miscalled strikes by Colgan, and filled the bases with but one man out. Then Anderson's double play retired the side.

Muller sent the ball to center field for a hit, but was caught at second when Van Buren tried to sacrifice. Van Buren stole second, but Umpire Colgan's eyes were blurred by the smoky atmosphere, and he called the runner out. Anderson hit to left field for what should have been a two-bagger, but he missed first base and had to go back and touch it. Then, when he tried to stretch the other bag on to the hit, he was caught at second.

The work of Colgan seemed to disconcert Cunningham, and he suffered more in the second. He drew a base on balls when he should have had three strikes, and Keefe did the same. Harmon got a walk in the back which filled the bases, with no outs. Letcher thought he saw an easy manner in which to get a run, so he dodged into the ball, but, for a wonder, Colgan would not let him take his base. He afterward drew a pass and forced in Fisher. Then Werner took the box. A three-bagger by Nagle scored Keefe, Harmon and Letcher.

With two men out, Portland squeezed in a run in the third with great assistance by Colgan and several errors. Muller sent a long fly to left field, where Nagle got under it, but failed to hold on to the ball, and Muller got to second. An error by McCarthy put Muller on third, and Van Buren on first. Van Buren started for second, but was caught between the bases. McCarthy chased him almost to first, and then threw the ball to Hutchinson, and Van Buren was out. Then it was that Colgan got generous to Portland. He called Van Buren safe. By that time Hutchinson had tossed the ball into the field, and the players were all coming in from their positions, and Muller had crossed the plate. Van Buren again started for second, but McCarthy threw to second and caught him. Then came some mighty kicking, but it did no good, and Portland got a run that it was not entitled to.

In the sixth a three-bagger by Letcher and a double play by Nagle, together with an error by Werner, added two more runs to the Tacoma score. Muller landed on the ball for a liner that bounced over Fisher's head in the eighth and got three bases. He scored when Van Buren was retired at first. Weed put a fly into right field in the ninth, and Nagle misjudged it and Weed got two bases. Harris got to first on an error by Keefe, and a hit to right by Diesel scored Weed. That was as far as Portland's fireworks would burn, so the Tigers got the game and Portland failed to get to the .500 mark. The score:

ROBBER WITH A PISTOL.

Highwayman Holds Up East Side Saloon-keeper for \$23.

With a handkerchief tied from ear to ear, a robber, with a formidable revolver in his right hand, suddenly presented himself at Clyde Evans' saloon, 406 Hawthorne avenue, last Friday night, and forced Evans to part with \$23. Then the robber tried to induce Evans to join him in a friendly hold-up game in a neighboring saloon, but Evans declined.

Evans had paid the money received during the day in the course of business in one of his pockets, and was about to close the saloon for the night, when a fierce-looking stranger presented himself, and in deep, growling, dime-novel accents he said: "You do what I tell you or there will be a lot of trouble around here." Evans gazed at him in astonishment, and the stranger proceeded: "Show me where you keep your money, and be quick about it, or this pistol may go off." The robber gazed scornfully at the empty cash drawer and then forced Evans to fork over what he had in his pockets, \$23 in cash.

"Now, back out into the street," said the man with the revolver, and the next minute Evans found himself walking ahead with his grim captor close behind him. They walked in this manner for about three blocks, and Evans wished all the time that he would come across a stray policeman or two. But he had no such luck. Suddenly the robber seemed to be struck with a new idea, and he had the effrontery to propose to Evans that the latter join him in holding up a saloon in the neighborhood.
