

TWO NEW HATCHERIES

MAY BE ESTABLISHED ON THE COLUMBIA'S TRIBUTARIES.

Washington's Deputy Fish Commissioner Will Make Recommendations—One Site on Gray's River.

ASTORIA, Aug. 9.—(Special.)—Deputy Fish Commissioner Burton, of Washington, who has been visiting the various points on the lower river, collecting fish for license, reports that his collections this year far exceed those of last season, and he expects to establish one if not two new hatcheries on tributaries to the Lower Columbia in the immediate future. One of the places which he has recommended as a site is on Gray's River. He believes that better results can be accomplished by having the hatcheries located close to lidewater than by placing them on the streams farther inland. The plan in connection with the operation of a hatchery on Gray's River is to construct a large pond where fish from the runs early in the season can be kept until they are of suitable size for propagation purposes. In this way, he believes, the parent fish can be kept in much better condition than those which fight their way to the upper river, and the small fry when turned out will have a much shorter distance to travel and fewer natural enemies to contend with in reaching the salt water. Another circumstance in favor of hatcheries on tributaries is the fact that the late July runs do not go to the Upper Columbia but enter the streams adjacent to its mouth. Thus, it is contended, fish for propagating purposes can be secured at a time when hatcheries from the runs of every month during the season.

The fishing situation on the river today is in an uncertain condition, the feature being that a large proportion of the gear is being taken out of the water and stored for the season. PLEASANT TIME FOR TOURISTS. Portlanders en Route to Crater Lake Receive a Welcome.

EAGLE POINT, Or., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—May 22, 1902, President Roosevelt signed Congressman Tongue's Crater Lake bill, and that wonderful region became a national park, the first in Oregon. August 6 the following persons left Portland to visit it: Hon. Thomas H. Tongue, of Hillsboro; E. M. Lombard, James Steel, Frank H. Fleming, Mrs. Lee Hoffman, Mrs. Hoffman and Will G. Steele, of Portland; Mrs. H. B. H. Merriam, of Brookline, N. Y. At Salem we were joined by Governor and Mrs. George, Miss Margaret J. Cooper and Miss Louis Clark. No pains or expense was spared to make the trip as comfortable as possible, and the idea that with the liner man established outward appearances would indicate a good time. So far the plan seems to work in fine shape. At Medford we were met by prominent citizens, who did everything in their power to aid us and make our stay among them pleasant. Largely through the efforts of Dr. J. M. Keene, an enthusiastic interest in the matter, and the created and active steps taken to entertain and fit out Crater Lake parties at Medford. This work has been carefully planned, it being handled by public school business men, and nothing will be left undone to make Medford a perfect outfitting station, where every item necessary can be obtained by parties desiring to visit Crater Lake. The Board of Trade is moving actively in the matter, and a pamphlet will be issued free, giving all sorts of information, including cost of outfit and transportation, distance, location of interesting points, camping places and how to reach them. When it once becomes known that strangers will be assisted in this way and that everything necessary can be obtained at Medford as cheap and good as elsewhere, there should be a great increase in Crater Lake travel. In less than an hour after reaching Medford our supplies had been loaded and the wagon was on their way to Eagle Point, 15 miles distant. Lunch was prepared at the Hotel Nash at 12 o'clock, and at 5 o'clock we were on our way, having avoided the heat of the day. We have good, covered spring wagons, or hacks, there has been no dust, and progress so far has been pleasant in every detail.

At Eagle Point we met a hearty reception and were supplied with fresh fruit and other things to make camp life more pleasant. Citizens of this town gathered around our campfire and were addressed by Governor Geer and Mr. Tongue. When the latter concluded the exercises closed with music. Today we move on to J. H. Stewart's Summer home, where he is starting his new fruit farm. We will be entertained by him for lunch, and hope to prevail on him to accompany us to Crater Lake. WILL G. STEEL.

SUIT FOR WATER RIGHTS. Anticipated Proceedings for Water Right Begun in Baker.

BAKER CITY, Aug. 9.—(Special.)—A suit was filed in the Circuit Court here yesterday which involves a water right in Pine Creek valued at over \$100,000. It is the largest and most complicated water right suit that has ever been filed in the courts of this county. The suit was filed by Olmsted & Miller, as attorneys for E. Osborn, administrator of the estate of Olive O. Coleman deceased, vs. J. P. Perkins and 42 other defendants, among whom are some of the wealthiest and most prominent farmers and ranchers in the county. The land, the water right of which is thus brought in question, is in the northwestern part of the county, in the vicinity of Wingville, and comprising several thousand acres of the richest farming land in the county. Most of it is under a high state of cultivation. The title, as claimed by the plaintiff, dates back to 1863, and involves the water right of about 4000 acres of land belonging to the estate. The water of Pine Creek has been appropriated by the defendants, all of whose claims, according to the complaint, are antedated by the claim of the plaintiff. In the event of the court allowing the claim of the plaintiff, there will not be enough water for the use of the defendants. The case bids fair to be long drawn out, and of course it will be hotly contested from the first, although, in fact, many of the defendants are interested in the litigation from the standpoint of the plaintiff, in that it is a friendly suit so far as they are concerned, and the final decision will only determine their legal right to the water they are now using.

TO REDISTRIBUTE COUNTY. Kalmia Commissioners Make Division—Increased Population.

NORTH YAKIMA, Aug. 9.—(Special.)—When the County Commissioners met in June, attention was called to the fact that the three districts of the county had grown in population and that the representation was unequally divided. At that time it was stated that as the August meeting of the board the matter would be adjusted. This subject was taken up Thursday by the Commissioners and a redistricting decided upon. The districts will contain election precincts as follows: First District—Wenas, Naches, Nile, Selah, Moses, Fairview, North Yakima, Nos. 1, 2 and 3, population 222; Second District—Coeville, Tampion, Abitama, Fruitvale, Nob Hill, Yakima City, North Yakima No. 1, Toppenish, Parker, Mount Adams, population 5207; Third District—Zillah, Battlemans, Sumner, Grand Coulee, Bad Rock, Alder Creek, Mabton, Kennecreek, White Bluffs, population 927; the Indians in the reservation not being counted.

The Commissioners of Yakima County this morning acquiesced in the petition of taxpayers and voters of Sunnyside for permission to hold a special election for incorporation of the city of Sunnyside for the fourth class. By the order of the Commissioners, the election is to be held on September 2, at Odd Fellows' Hall, in Sunnyside, at the same time a choice of a mayor, five Councilmen and a treasurer. The judges of election are to be James Henderson and William Cloud, while Rev. A. H. Lyons is to be inspector.

HORSES BURNED IN BARN. Incendiary Blaze Probably Causes the Loss of a Man's Life.

COLFAX, Wash., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—A man named by Edward White was burned here this afternoon, together with a fine team of driving horses, harness and a lot of hay. People living near the barn say that the fire was discovered by a man who ran into the barn and did not come out. It is believed that the fire was caused by the horses under many tons of hay. The fire is supposed to have started in a warehouse owned by Mr. White, which was burned Monday evening. It was unburned, but White had since insured the barn for \$200. The total loss is \$200. Officers are looking for the cause of the fire, but they believe that the fire was the work of a gang of boys.

LAST OF OUTLAW TRACY

REMAINS BURIED BESIDE THE GRAVE OF MERRILL.

Chemicals Placed in the Coffin to Destroy Body—How Claims for Reward May Be Settled.

The remains of Harry Tracy were received in Salem yesterday morning, and were quietly buried in the prison cemetery by the side of David Merrill, the confederate whom the outlaw had conspired to murder. A few people were allowed to see the corpse, but at the depot many hacked mementoes from the cheap coffin. The burial was unattended by ceremony. Before the coffin was lowered chemicals were placed in it for the purpose of destroying the corpse, but the grave will be watched, in order to prevent any person from stealing the body. As the body was positively identified by the prison officials, there is no question as to the payment of the reward, but who is to claim it is a problem for the claimants and the state to solve. His famous rifle was given to the officials. Merrill's rifle was found in the brush within 200 yards of the spot where his body was discovered.

SALEM, Aug. 9.—(Special.)—The body of Harry Tracy was received in Salem today from the State Penitentiary, Wash. It was this afternoon interred in the prison cemetery. The members of the Washington posse claim the entire reward of \$1500 offered for this state, but the following telegram was received from Sheriff J. H. Gardner, of Lincoln County, Washington, at the Governor's office shortly after the arrival of the body: "Do not pay Tracy reward until other claims can be filed." Thus far no other claimants to the reward have made themselves known, nor have any been filed against the state for the receiving of the Gardner telegram or other conflicting claim. It was the intention of the Oregon officers to settle with the members of the Washington posse on the basis of the reward money. When the Gardner telegram was received Superintendent Lee informed the men to whom he had given a receipt for the body that further negotiations pertaining to the reward money should be deferred until it had been decided to whom the money shall be paid. He further said that he would prefer that the Washington contestants for the reward comply with a request upon a man to whom the Oregon officials might turn over the money, the agent to hold the same until the proper manner of its distribution might be determined. Buried Beside Merrill. The final chapter in the remarkable career of the multi-murderer was recited in Salem today when the remains of the criminal were buried beside those of his associate-in-crime David Merrill, in the prison burying ground. Will Fight for the Reward. Messrs. Straub, Lanter and Smith tonight filed with Secretary of State Dunbar claims amounting to \$285. The sum represents the cost of the transportation of the party to Salem and the return home, and also the expenses of embalming the body of Tracy and the purchase of a plain casket, as directed by the Oregon officials. The claim was filed in the same form as those of others who will ask to be reimbursed. The firm of Straub, Lanter and Smith for their Washington home tomorrow morning. They state that within a few days they will file in the office of the Secretary of State a formal claim for \$200 reward which had been promised to them in compromise upon an agent who shall be authorized to accept and hold the money until it is legally determined to whom the money belongs. In this way, all necessity for litigation in this state will be removed. The three men who delivered Tracy's body to Superintendent Lee today declare that their party, which included two brothers, Merrill and Albert, foreman, and Frank Lillengren, is entitled to all of the reward, and they propose to make a vigorous fight in the courts.

DRILLING PLANT DESTROYED. Destructive Fire in Property of Oil Company. ASHLAND, Or., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—The drilling plant of the Southern Oregon Oil Company, on the hillside east of Ashland, which had progressed to the well to a depth of nearly 2000 feet, and operations were to be resumed shortly. No one was supposed to be around the premises at the time, and Mr. Wright, the proprietor of the barn that was also burned, was at the time of the blaze. The entire loss is estimated at \$5000.

Prisoners Implementing Each Other. WILKESBARRE, Pa., Aug. 9.—Four men are now in the County Jail, charged with the murder of Daniel Sweeney, the mine watchman who was found dead in the roadway at Naticoke last Wednesday morning. The District Attorney and the county detective say the prisoners are now charging each other with complicity in the murder of Sweeney.

FOUND MERRILL'S GUN. It Was in the Bush 200 Yards From Where Body Was Discovered. CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—John Goff and Fred Runcorn have just returned from the scene of the Merrill killing and from the rifle owned by Merrill. They found the gun 200 yards north of where the body was found, about 20 feet from the road, and it had evidently been thrown into the brush from the road. It is a .30-caliber, model 189 Winchester rifle. There were no cartridges in the chamber or magazine and the gun was cocked when picked up. There are some rust spots on the barrel but otherwise the gun is in very good condition.

SEVERED HIS ARTERIES

DESPERATE ATTEMPT OF H. G. FLOEGER TO COMMIT SUICIDE.

Was Formerly Treasurer of Coos County, and for 40 Years a Resident of That Section.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 9.—Henry G. Floeger now lies at death's door from wounds inflicted by his own hands. The arteries in his right arm are severed, and a deep gash in his throat tells the story of his attempted suicide. Floeger was found in this condition in the suburbs of West Marshfield, where he had wandered in his delirium to commit the rash act. He had been a resident of this county for 40 years, filling the positions of County Treasurer and postmaster at Empire City several terms. Several weeks ago he resigned the position of assistant keeper of the Umpqua light station, which has held for six years. It was in this capacity that his mind became deranged, and he suffered temporary fits of insanity. Floeger is married, and is insured in the Woodmen.

BARTENDER FATALLY WOUNDED. Skull Fractured by a Robber, Who Looted the Cash-Box.

SEATTLE, Aug. 9.—Fred Ernst, night bartender in a local saloon, was struck on the head with the knippen of a wagon this morning, and his skull so badly fractured that he will die. Robbery is believed to be the motive for the assault, as \$11 was taken from the cash register, only a few cents in dimes and nickles being left by the robber. Philip Ethier, cited as a porter at another saloon, was arrested on suspicion, and is now detained at the City Prison pending an investigation. Ethier has a bad reputation in police circles, and a large tree crashed through the roof and the unfortunate woman was mangled almost beyond recognition.

Fisherman Kills Himself. ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—Harry Lauterbach, a fisherman, committed suicide at his home in a scow above Tongue Point this evening by shooting himself in the temple. He appeared in the best of health and sprits a few minutes before committing the act, and no cause can be assigned for it. The deceased was a native of Holland, about 53 years of age, and had fished for Warren a number of years. He was a single man, and so far as known had no relatives in this country.

Boy Played With Matches. ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—The 3-year-old son of Nick Davis, of Cathlamet, was seriously burned a few days ago, and his injuries are so serious that it is feared he cannot live. He was playing with some matches, which ignited his clothing, burning his body and face severely.

RANDS SUCCEEDS COOK. Elected Chairman of Clark County Republican Committee. VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—A meeting of the Republican Central Committee was held in the Courthouse this afternoon pursuant to a call issued by Chairman A. J. Cook. The first work of the committee was to elect a chairman to fill the place vacated by the resignation of Mr. Cook. E. M. Rands and L. B. Clough were placed in nomination and Rands was elected by a vote of 12 to 8. The county convention was set for August 27, and the primaries will be held on the 30th.
