Bunchgrassers Pull Out Victory on a Wet Field.

PITCHER QUICK SHOWS SPEED

Cunningham Forces In a Run and Is Retired in the First Inning—Kostal Pitches Good Game—Score, 5 to 2.

Spokane pulled out a victory yesterday.

The first one taken by the Bunchgrassers in Portland this year. The score was 5 to 2, and the game, considering the fact that it was played in the mud, was good. Cunningham, who first occupied the box for Portland, was wild and had to be taken out, his successor being Kostal, who was released by Spokane and signed by Portland on Friday. When the customary time for play arrived, there was a good crowd in attendance, but the heavy downpour of rain that soon began spoiled the surface of the grounds and dampened the crowd's enthusiasm. When the shower ceased, and the rain clouds rolled by, Manager Sammie Vigneux appeared with a broom and began to sweep the water from the little puddles in the diamond. Vigneux was soon reinforced by Engle, under whose direction sawdust was spread around the bases. While these stunts were going on in the diamond, Julius Caesar, addressed some pointed remarks to those in the grandstand, telling them if the Portland men played winning ball, they would win. He also expressed sympathy for "poor old Spokane." As usual, Mr. J. Caesar's remarks were greeted with prolonged applause.

Cunningham Was Wild.

At 4 o'clock play was called, with Spokane at the bat. Cunningham was very wild and sent two men to first on balls, allowed a safe hit by Denny Shea on a shoulder, passing him to first, thus forcing McLaughlin in for a score. Cunningham was then removed and Kostal substituted. A safe hit by Donahue scored Peris, and the bleachers began to groan in expectation of more fireworks. The next play was a double, one of the prettiest ever seen on the local field. McKevitt hit the ball to Weed, who played into Denny Shea's hands in time to shut out Retts from a score. Quick as a flash, Shea threw the ball back to Weed, and McKevitt was retired at first. The spectators shouted for confidence in the home team had been fully restored. Kostal settled down to business. Frary fanned the air three times, and Spokane retired.

Anderson Scores Two Runs.

Both of Portland's tallies were made by Andy Anderson, one in the fourth, and the other in the sixth. The home team was unable to bunch hits on Quick, who seemed to have got control all through the game. Harris got three safe hits, stole two bases and played his position faultlessly, while Weed, Anderson and Deisel played good ball in the infield. Ziegler was unavailably absent yesterday, but George Engle loomed up in the right garden and nailed a couple of dangerous-looking flies. Muller and Van Buren got everything that came their way, and, considering the slippery condition of the field, did excellent work. Kostal is a promising pitcher, and those who saw yesterday's game are wondering why Grim released him.

One of the prettiest plays of the whole game was a high jump and single-handed catch by Shortstop Peris in the sixth. Donahue landed three safe hits, and otherwise played good ball on third bag. An amusing incident occurred in the third inning, when Muller knocked a foul over toward the north bleachers. Fielder McKevitt was after it, running like a deer, and before he could check himself, he stumbled up against the wall beyond the foul line. Instantly he grabbed the top of the wall and dove headlong over it, disappearing from view. The incident produced much merriment. McKevitt, who was somewhat dazed, however, for Muller sent a fly right into his hands. The score:

BURTON IN HOT WATER.

Kansas Senator Is Having Trouble Because He Opposed Cuban Relief.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Aug. 16.—Senator Burton, of Kansas, according to all reports received in Washington, is having more trouble than any other Senator who joined the insurgent camp and opposed the President's policy on Cuban reciprocity. Burton went to the Kansas convention determined to have the Republicans endorse his stand, which had been taken in a rather half-hearted way up to that time. The convention practically repudiated him and stood by Chester L. Long, a member of the ways and means committee, who did more than any other man to secure the passage of the reciprocity bill in the House, and who stood by the President, and in as plain terms as an ordinary man would want instructed Burton to support the President's policy. Burton would not do it. In fact, he was vigorous in his opposition toward the last, Platt amendment.
