

FAVORS MARKET PLACE

MILWAUKIE GRANGE INDORSES EAST SIDE PROJECT.

Movement to Establish Farmers' Headquarters and Restrooms Also Meets Approval.

At a fairly well attended meeting of the Milwaukee Grange held yesterday in that place, after thorough discussion, it was decided to favor the proposition of establishing a market place and restrooms on the East Side, and to indorse the offer by the Hawthornes of a block for that purpose for a long term of years. In the absence of Richard Scott, master of the Grange, S. Sellwood presided. Mrs. M. E. Shafford was present, and on invitation explained at length the purpose of the proposed restrooms and farmers' headquarters, and answered questions from the members of the Grange. It seemed to be the consensus of opinion that this is a movement in the right direction, and it was voted to aid the project.

The intention is now to lay the matter before the Grange. For this purpose Mrs. Shafford will visit the Damascus and Logan Granges Saturday, September 6. The Damascus Grange will first be visited in the morning, and the matter of the farmers' headquarters laid before the members, and the Logan Grange in the afternoon. It is desired that there should be a full attendance of the members at these meetings. The Damascus Grange meets the second Saturday in September. It will also be visited and the headquarters proposition there laid before the members. The movement is received with much favor when it is clearly explained.

BUILDING READY TO FALL. Front of Grand-Avenue Structure Threatened to Collapse.

That portion of the one-story building on the west side of Grand avenue, between East Washington and East Alder streets, occupied by Edward Renfer and Pomeroy's cigar store, seems in a dangerous condition. On Friday it was discovered that the upper portion of the front of the building was bending forward, and was in imminent danger of plunging down on to Grand avenue. Very quickly some heavy timbers were placed bracing the front. Half a dozen or more of these timbers were placed, which will prevent the threatened collapse.

The cause of the trouble is the settling of the foundation of the front of the building. The brick were laid on the ground when the building was erected, and there was no sound foundation. Some heavy iron bars will be put in, and the building made safe. One part of the weak portion is owned by A. W. Oecoback, and the other by S. Manning.
