REV. E. M. MILLS, OF NEW YORK, TO PREACH AT
TAYLOR-STREET METHODIST

Rev. E. M. Mills, D. D., of New York City, and secretary of the Twentieth-Century Thank Offering of the Methodist Episcopal Church, will preach in Taylor-Street Church at 10:30 this morning and at 7:45 in the evening. The Sunday school will be held at 12 and the Epworth League at 6:45.

Dr. Mills has long been a leader of the church in the State of New York, and has for three years been in charge of the thank offering by which the church undertook to raise \$30,000,000 with which to pay the debts on church and parsonage property and to increase the endowment of its educational institutions. During the time that Dr. Mills has directed the undertaking a total of a little more than \$7,000,000 has been for educational work and the remainder applied on church debts with the exception of some small sums applied to other philanthropies of the denomination. Dr. Mills is a member of the Board of Control of the Epworth League. Dr. Mills is in attendance on the conference of this region and has come from Caldwell, Idaho, to preach in this church today and will return tomorrow to the Columbia River conference at Coles, Wash.

Colonel Sobieski is a Polish nobleman, son of Count John Sobieski, and a lineal descendant of King John Sobieski, of Poland. Count Sobieski was the leader of the uprising for liberty in 1846, for which he was executed, and his wife and young son banished from the country. True to his inborn principles of liberty and justice, Colonel Sobieski has devoted his grand life, his wonderful eloquence, to the temperance reform, and is recognized as one of the foremost lecturers on the lecture platform. He will deliver the annual sermon of the Multnomah County W. C. T. U. this evening, at the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, corner East Twelfth and Taylor streets.
