Harvest Home Festival Will Be Held at St. Matthew's Episcopal.

Following the old English custom of holding harvest home festivals, St. Matthew's Episcopal Church, corner of First and Caruthers streets, will be decorated with fruits, vegetables and grain. The music and sermon will be appropriate to the occasion. A road-screen has been erected and covered with wheat and oats. Standing corn forms the background of the chancel, and fruits and vegetables are arranged around the altar. After the services the fruits and vegetables are distributed to the poor.
