

PICK TOWER AS MAN

Germans Believe He Will Succeed White.

LIST OF NAMES FOR OFFICE

Kaiser Would Be Pleased to Receive Either Tower, Storer or Hill—American Procedure in Case Out of the Ordinary.

BERLIN, Sept. 13.—The Foreign Office has received from the German Embassy at Washington a memorandum of inquiry made by Secretary Hay as to whether it would be agreeable to receive as Ambassador, in succession to the late Count von Helldorf, the present United States Ambassador at St. Petersburg, Bellamy Storer, now United States Minister at Madrid, or David J. Hill, Assistant Secretary of State. The Foreign Office has instructed the charge d'affaires to say that any one of the three is acceptable. The impression here is that Mr. Tower is the most likely to be appointed.

Submitting a list of names, instead of a single name, is quite outside of diplomatic custom. Usually only one name is proposed. Mr. White, however, has departed from this custom, and will probably remain here until he presents his letters of recall to Emperor William. As it is understood that it would be agreeable to Mr. White to conclude his term of office on his 70th birthday, November 7, his Majesty will doubtless receive him in farewell audience that day.

MARCONI SYSTEM PLEASURES ARMY. Wireless Telegraphy Feature of German Maneuvers a Success.

BERLIN, Sept. 13.—The novelties at the army maneuvers just ended were wireless telegraphy and Boer tactics. The result of the wireless experiments seem completely satisfactory, and in the opinion of the military chiefs will enormously affect the transmission of intelligence during battle. The cavalry corps, in making the detour yesterday, kept constantly in touch with headquarters through the wireless telegraph, enabling the corps to hasten or retard its movement through the 32-mile ride, as in the judgment of the headquarters staff, changes in the situation were required. It will now be possible to deliver co-ordinate attacks by widely separated divisions in that way, hitherto impossible.

Boer tactics were used extensively during the third day of the maneuvers, when the infantry deployed in open order and advanced regardless of regular formation, each man or squad taking advantage of irregularities in the ground for cover, running forward in small sections, instead of in a whole line, falling down again and once more advancing. The artillery also, instead of being marched on prominent points where guns and gunners would become targets for the enemy's guns, was placed in selected, covered positions, each battery taking up its position without regard to alignment with the others.

LUNACY INCREASES IN LONDON. Fifty Per Cent Greater Now Than 10 Years Ago—City Debt Larger.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—The report of the London County Council, just published, furnishes some striking figures indicating the immensity of the municipal problem with which London authorities are confronted. According to the census of 1901, the population of the administrative county of London was 4,536,541, while Greater London, immediately surrounding the county, showed an additional population of 6,500,000.

The lunacy statistics of the administrative county show an increase of 50 per cent in the last 10 years, the total number of lunatics being 21,330, of whom 10,000 are in asylums, and 11,330 are in domestic and business troubles were accounted to be largely responsible. The problem of lunatics is a serious one, and the Council acting as landlord to a population of 11,330 housed in cottages, block buildings and various other structures. The year's working showed a net surplus of \$11,565 for the previous year.

The city debt statistics show an encouraging decrease, the total debt outstanding being \$21,264,355, equivalent to 124.36 per cent of the rateable value, against 194.65 per cent when the London County Council came into existence. The tax rates now amount to about 26½ per cent sterling.

DEAREST PLACE IN WORLD TO LIVE Johannesburg People Pay Exorbitant Prices for Everything.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—Prices from Johannesburg show that South Africa at present is the dearest place in the world to live. A correspondent writes that it is high time to sound a note of warning and check the inflationary movement, which promises to lead to great difficulties and serious distress. The worst sufferers, it is added, are women workers, teachers, typewriters and shop girls, who are met with the almost invariable reply that "no single woman lodgers are admitted." Rents increase every month, and have nearly doubled since peace was declared. Families of moderate means have to spend 40 to 50 per cent of their income to secure the most accommodations which decency requires. The prices on all foods are exorbitant. Beer costs \$1 a bottle. Wages are about the same as before the war. The correspondent asserts that a clerk in London on a salary of \$30 a year is more fortunate than one in South Africa at \$150.

SISTERS EXPELLED FROM SCHOOLS. Strong Force of Military Again Takes Up Crusade.

BREST, France, Sept. 13.—The subprefect of Finistère, accompanied by a strong force of gendarmes and military, unexpectedly arrived at Brest today and again expelled the Sisters who were turned out in August, but who returned later, after discovering a decree dated 1923, which they alleged removed them from the scope of the law of associations. The subprefect also released the school, amid the protest of the inhabitants. The Sisters had appealed to the prefect, but their children's school was closed today. The government has re-installed the Sisters by its movement of today.

ANTI-SEMITIC OUTBREAK. Polish Mob Kills Fourteen Jews and Wrecks Their Shops.

VIENNA, Sept. 13.—A serious anti-Semitic outbreak has occurred at Czenstochowa, a pilgrim resort in Poland. A mob stormed the Jewish shops and wrecked the bread shops, and, according to the Slovoplek, 14 Jews and one gent were killed and a number were injured. The military was summoned to restore order.

Soldiers Kill Two Rioters. The militia at Czenstochowa, which was three times commanded to disperse, and replied by stoning the troops. The soldiers then fired, and killed two Christian rioters and wounded several others. The

immediate cause of the riot was the wounding of a peasant woman by a Jewish shopkeeper with whom she was disputing.

Alarmed Over American Enterprise. LONDON, Sept. 13.—The British trade journals continue to comment on American enterprise in South Africa, and the extent which the American machinery dominates the market. The Engineer says American firms are completely supplanting the English firms at Cape Town, chiefly by carrying a large stock and making quick delivery.

Knox Leaves Paris. PARIS, Sept. 13.—Attorney-General Knox and Special Assistant Attorney-General Russell left here for Cherbourg today, to embark on the steamer St. Paul. Mr. Knox said he had nothing to add to his statement of Wednesday last, and would reserve his opinion of the Panama Canal titles for President Roosevelt himself.

Train Passengers Drowned in Flood. MADRAS, British India, Sept. 13.—An English mail train yesterday, en route from this city, dashed over a bridge that had been undermined by floods. Fifty passengers, including eight Europeans and four soldiers, were drowned.

Leopold to Visit America. BRUSSELS, Sept. 13.—It is announced that King Leopold will visit the United States next year. The time of the visit has been definitely fixed for next February and March.

MOB BREAKS IN JAIL. But Sheriff Prevents the Crowd From Taking a Prisoner.

BUTLER, Pa., Sept. 14.—A mob of 200 men attempted at 1 o'clock this morning to break into the County Jail and get Jerry Bennett, aged 25 years, who was arrested last yesterday in the act of assaulting a 7-year-old girl. The mob battered down the jail door, but was held back by Sheriff Horn and armed deputies. The officers fired over the heads of the crowd to frighten them, but were unsuccessful. The mob, however, were severely hurt, and one officer shot. George Klein, a young steelworker, in the leg. At 2 o'clock the mob dispersed.

PETITION FOR INJUNCTION. Move to Prevent Sale of Chicago Building Involved in Tax Scandal.

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—The development in the Masonic Temple tax-fixing scandal today was a petition filed in the Circuit Court for an injunction restraining the County Treasurer and 122 other persons from selling the 22-story office-building for the unpaid taxes of 1901, amounting to over \$36,000. The bill sets up that the taxes were regularly paid, and that the association has the receipt. The receipt in question is the one alleged to have been forged with a view to the association escaping its taxes and for the alleged utterance of a long and elaborate affidavit by William, manager of the association, and three others, were recently indicted by the grand jury. The bill also states that the entry of "paid" that was said to have been forged by the County Treasurer's warrant book opposite the Masonic Temple item was erased without warrant of law.

HIGHWAYMAN HOLDS CITY. Lone Man Robs Nine People Under Very Close of the Police.

Plundered Guilty to Embezzlement. HELENA, Mont., Sept. 13.—John W. Sheriff O'Connell left this afternoon for Deer Lodge with Andrews.

OIL GUSHER STILL BURNING. Beaumont Will Endeavor to Smother It With Steam.

BEAUMONT, Tex., Sept. 13.—Tonight one large gusher is still burning, sending a volume of flame into the air. Efforts made this afternoon to extinguish the flames were not successful, but more boilers have been sent for, and the plan of smothering it with steam will again be tried. The small tank burned itself out this afternoon, and the big one will probably die out by morning. Many of the oil companies have lost their pumping plants and have wired orders for new machines. An examination leads to the belief that none of the wells has been permanently injured. There is a new problem to be confronted as soon as the burning gusher is extinguished, and that is the control of the well. The gate valve has been melted off, and while it is probable that this can be replaced, it will be a difficult operation. Estimates of the damage still vary, but there is general acceptance of about \$100,000 as the figure that will cover the loss. The first fatality of the fire occurred today, when E. L. May was killed by falling from a derrick.

Coal Prices Soaring High. CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—The price of soft coal in Chicago has risen to \$4 a ton, as compared with \$2.75 on September 7. Anthracite is practically unobtainable, and is quoted by some dealers as high as \$25 a ton. The sudden advance in prices is attributed to the cold and severe weather, which has aroused householders to a realization that their buildings are empty.

Situation at Colon Unchanged. COLON, Sept. 13.—The situation here is unchanged. The government is adopting stringent measures against the Liberals. The United States cruiser Cincinnati is expected here tomorrow from Cape Haytien.

UNABLE TO SETTLE STRIKE

STONE'S CONFERENCE COMMITTEE MAKES NO HEADWAY.

President Mitchell Says the Governor Had No Proposition to Make to Bring About Peace.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 13.—The conference between Governor Stone and President Mitchell, of the United Mineworkers of America, on matters pertaining to the strike, ended at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon, after a discussion of 2½ hours. The others at the conference were State Senator William Duff, of Pittsburgh, a political friend of the Governor and a large employer of labor in Allegheny County; M. E. McMullin, of Pittsburgh, a wealthy man of many interests; Colonel W. P. Richardson, of Harrisburg, keeper of the State Arsenal and Assistant Quartermaster of the National Guard, and District President Thomas D. Nichols of Scranton. Thomas Duff, of Pittsburgh, and John Fahey of Shamokin. At the conclusion of the meeting Governor Stone gave to the waiting newspaper men the following written statement:

"Messrs. Mitchell, Nichols, Fahey, Duff, Senator Flynn, Colonel Richardson and Governor Stone have been in conference. All the differences have been discussed with the best of feeling. Every effort to get the participants in the conference to divulge what took place proved unavailing. Messrs. Mitchell, Duff and Fahey took the 4:40 P. M. train for Wilkes-Barre. Mr. Nichols remaining here. President Mitchell, before leaving, would not even say whether the conference was satisfactory to him and his district president."

While no official information can be had on the matter, it is believed here that Governor Stone and his colleagues submitted a proposition to President Mitchell which will tend to end the struggle in the hard-coal fields. The conference was the result of the visit of Governor Stone, Senator Flynn, Attorney-General Elkins, Mr. McMullin and P. A. B. Wilener, of Philadelphia, to New York a few days ago, when Mr. Wilener called on J. P. Morgan. The meeting was called at the instigation of the Governor.

Order Restraining Railroad. CINCINNATI, Sept. 13.—Judge Cochran, of the United States Court at Cincinnati, Ky., today granted a temporary order restraining the Cincinnati and Northern Ohio Railway Company from interfering with the delivery of groceries in the West Virginia coal fields. The suit was brought by Cincinnati wholesale grocers. The firm asserted that seven carloads of groceries shipped to the coal fields had been sent 300 miles beyond their destination.

Financial Aid for Miners. NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Samuel Gomper, president of the American Federation of Labor, in addressing 2000 persons who had gathered to attend a mass meeting at Madison Square in behalf of the striking coal miners tonight, announced that just before starting for the mines he had received a gift of \$1000 to aid the miners. Mr. Gomper was not at liberty to announce the name of the donor.

Street in Hands of a Mob. OTTUMWA, Ia., Sept. 13.—Main street, for several hours tonight, was in the hands of a mob of sympathizers with the striking street-car men. The few cars running were held up and stoned, and the windows smashed. The nonunion men were finally driven off the streets.

Street-Car Strike Serious. OTTUMWA, Ia., Sept. 13.—The street-car strike is assuming a serious aspect. The blacksmiths in the employ of the company struck this morning. The city depends upon the street-car plant for electric power, which may be shut off.

FELL ON THEIR KNEES. Arlington People Thought the World Was Coming to an End.

PENDLETON, Sept. 13.—(Special).—Fears that the world was coming to an end, caused by smoke from the Cascades that made the sun look like a ball of fire, caused many people at Arlington today to fall on their knees and utter cries of mercy. The boats on the river turned on the searchlights, so dark and gloomy were the surroundings.

OREGON DID NOT LEAVE. Haze Over Puget Sound Made Departure Yesterday Inadvisable.

SEATTLE, Sept. 13.—The United States battleship Oregon did not put out to sea today. The thick haze that spread over Puget Sound made it inadvisable to risk the costly warship, especially in view of the fact that the ship's compass is out of adjustment and there is no pressing need for the boat. The officers of the Oregon will require two hours of clear weather to complete the work of adjusting the vessel's compass. The ship will continue to lie at the Puget Sound navy-yard until the atmosphere is clarified.

When the Oregon puts to sea it will be with a short crew, it is thought, and the boat believe she will be furnished with men when she reaches San Francisco. It is believed a number of men will be sent on to the Oregon, which is about 200 short of her regular crew, will have to return to San Francisco without a full force.

COTTAGE CITY CAN BE FLOATED. So Says Captain Lloyd, of the Strand.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Sept. 13.—(Special).—The steamship Spokane reached Port Townsend tonight, having on board 18 passengers from the steamer Cottage City, which recently ran ashore in Alaskan waters. Captain Lloyd of the Spokane predicts that the work of floating the stranded steamer will be easy when higher tides prevail, which will give a better opportunity for working on the hull and also for assisting the work of getting her into deep water again.

Has All Help He Needs. PENDLETON, Sept. 13.—W. P. Card, a farmer near here, by advertising for a wife, has become the happy possessor of a woman and six boys. He sent them tickets to Chicago, where he and his wife and stepsons arrived today. He has two farms, and says he has help enough to run them both now.

To Relieve Money Market. CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—Seeking to relieve, in a measure, the stringency in the Eastern money market, and also to benefit by the advancing rates for loans, Armour & Co. today sent \$1,000,000 to New York for loaning purposes.

Cold Wave Takes In More Territory. CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—The cold wave, which did much damage to the crops yesterday, extended its operations today south and east. Tennessee, Arkansas, Indiana and many Illinois towns reported frosts. Late crops were badly damaged.
