DIES FROM MULE KICK.—W. S. Monk, who was kicked in the face by a mule and badly injured a few days ago, died early yesterday morning at the Good Samaritan Hospital. Death was probably caused by concussion of the brain or intercranial hemorrhage. At the time of the accident the injuries seemed to be very severe, and it was stated that he had but little chance of recovery. His lower jaw was fractured in two places, his nose broken, besides a compound fracture of the skull, which itself must have proved fatal. Just how the accident happened he has never been able to tell. He was driving a team for the Banfield-Vesey Fuel Company. At Fifteenth and Gilman streets, Tom some trouble, and afterward was found there in an unconscious condition. The patrol wagon was sent for and he was taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital, but nothing could be done to save him. He suffered intensely from the time of his injury until his death. Monk was for several years in the employ of the City & Suburban Railway Company, and only recently had accepted a position with the Banfield-Vesey Fuel Company. His life was insured, and he was a member of the Woodmen of the World and the Knights of Pythias. The funeral has not yet been arranged for.

CHARGED WITH WORKING SHORT-CHANGE TRICK.—Frank Hammel, who was arrested last Friday by Detective Weiner, charged with working the short-change act in a Washington-street candy store, appeared in the Municipal Court yesterday, but as no witnesses were present to assist in the prosecution, a charge of vagrancy was filed against him. Hammel visited the store in a very angry mood, and in gold on the counter, he asked the girl clerk for 10 cents' worth of candy. It is charged that he placed \$3.00 in silver he received in his pocket, suddenly remarked, "I've got 10 cents in change," swooped down on the \$3.00 gold piece and walked out. It was some little time before the girl realized the extent of the trick. In the meantime she is sure about the identity of Hammel, and declines to prosecute him. The police state that the vagrancy charge will stand.

LIFE UNDERWRITERS' MEETING.—The Life Underwriters' Association of Oregon met for luncheon at the rooms of the Commercial Club yesterday at 1 o'clock. There was a good attendance, and the serving of the courses was interpreted with much of wit and humor among the members about the round table. Following the luncheon was an hour spent in swapping stories of life insurance experience and discussing technical points of the profession. After adjournment the association attended the ball game in a body, by courtesy of William Goldman. Some comment was caused in the grandstand by seeing the leading life insurance men of the state and representatives of competing companies lined up on the benches and joking together in the best good-fellowship. This is an indication of what the association is doing for the life insurance profession in this city. After the game the members parted with the feeling that this was the best meeting in the history of the association, and with plans for good work during the winter.

TO BEGIN THIRD-STREET IMPROVEMENT.—The City & Suburban Railway Company has announced that the long-delayed improvement to their Third-street tracks will begin Monday morning. The rails have not yet been discharged from the Gympshire, but they are in sight, and the company expects to have them in place in starting to tear up the old track. While reconstruction is going on, cars which now run on Third street will run on Second street. Upper and Lower Alder streets will turn back at Second and Yamhill streets, while 5 cars will run via Second and Grant to South Portland. Montgomery-street cars will run to Third and Grant, and the cars now do. The company expects to push this work as rapidly as is consistent with the best methods of construction.

CITY AUDITOR PREPARES SIDEWALK ORDINANCE.—City Auditor Devlin is preparing an ordinance relating to cement sidewalks which he thinks will insure the doing of good work in all cases and put a stop to objections made by some people to the cement sidewalk ordinance that will provide for the inspection of all private sidewalks by the City Engineer or one of his deputies, and will also contain specifications for construction of walks by naming the best brands of cement, the quantities of different materials to be used, etc. The specifications will be printed on the back of all sidewalk permits, so that people will understand exactly what is required to make a first-class cement sidewalk.
