**MR. WORTMAN'S OUTING.**—H. C. Wortman, of Olds, Wortman & King, arrived home Friday from a most delightful outing of two weeks, spent fishing and hunting in the great Cow Creek Canyon, Douglas County. He went to Glendale, and then with a party of about 20 miles to the head of Cow Creek, where fine mountain trout were plentiful and there is good hunting. Three deer were killed, and the party was successful in fishing, and as fortunate in breaking camp and getting away home in time to escape the rain. Mr. Wortman says that section is a wonderful country, with a great and prosperous future. One interesting feature of the outing was a visit to the Gold Bug mine, owned and operated by Senator Jones, of Nevada, one of the few thoroughly developed quartz mines in Southern Oregon, and a gold producer. There is a very complete plant in operation at the mine, including the cyanide process. Mr. Wortman, who has not been through many quartz mines, found it quite exciting, after going into a tunnel 300 feet, to be dropped down a shaft 300 feet, to the ore body that is being worked; but he found the inspection of the mine a very interesting feature of his outing.

**PORTLAND ARTIST RISE WINNER.**—Out of 25 designs submitted in an open contest at the Mark Hopkins Institute of Art, in San Francisco, that of John G. Seed, son of J. S. Seed, of this city, received first prize of \$20. Two prizes of \$10 and \$5 were offered by Charles J. Josselyn, who wished a cover for his new work, "My Favorite Bookshelf." Captain Fletcher, the author of the book, A. F. Matthews, the dean, and Louis A. Robertson were the judges. Mr. Seed's design was of a reader seated before his bookshelf. The picture, according to the San Francisco Chronicle, is striking and of high quality. The second prize was awarded to Miss Bertha Boye, and Frank J. Miller was given special mention. The successful contestant was at one time an artist on The Oregonian, afterwards going to California to pursue further study.

**WATERMEN MAY PLEAD GUILTY.**—Captain Wagon, of the ship Peter Rickerson, who is charged with selling a quantity of German cigars upon which no duty had been paid, has left his ship at Astoria and will appear before the United States Court tomorrow. It is understood that he will plead guilty to the charge and pay his fine without further parley, as his ship cannot be kept waiting while his captain is trying to prove his innocence. The customs officials believe, however, that they have evidence that would convict him, should he attempt to fight the case.

**DEATH OF GEORGE C. RITCHIE.**—From blood-poisoning, caused by the extraction of a wisdom tooth, George C. Ritchie, formerly of this city, died at Lewiston, Idaho, Friday night. Mr. Ritchie was well known in Portland, being for a long time marine reporter on the Evening Telegram and a contributor of "Talks With Travelers" to the editorial page of that paper. He was widely known also along the water front, and was at one time steam-boating on the Snake River. About three years ago he married Miss Elaine Kester, of Lewiston, who survives him. Archie A. Ritchie, of the Oregon Daily Journal, is a brother, and a sister lives in California. He will be buried today at Lewiston.

**GOLDEN EAGLE ARRIVES AT CITY PARK.**—A splendid-looking golden eagle, known as the aquila canadensis, was received yesterday by Colonel Hawkins from J. W. Clay, Dunsmuir, Or., for the City Park. The eagle, a young-looking bird, created quite a flutter among the other animals when he was placed in his new quarters. He was considerably chattering among the monkeys as to the proper person who should introduce the stranger among City Park society. A new hawk from a friend near The Dalles was also placed by Colonel Hawkins in the park last week.
