HARD TRIP OF TIMBER CRUISE.—A party of six land-lookers and timber-cruisers arrived here on the Southern Pacific train from Roseburg Saturday morning, still weary from a very exhausting tramp made Friday. They walked 22 miles through timber in a heavy rain, following a biased trail to Clark's place, on the Umpqua, where a team was waiting to take them into Roseburg. They were from early in the morning till dark on the trip, wet through and through. Mr. F. Brown, one of the cruisers, who has been "in the woods" for 15 years, was completely exhausted. Cruising timber land in such weather as has prevailed of late must be rather trying work.

WHY CUDDEE WAS ELECTED.—"It is probable that Ed Cuddee owes his reelection to the attacks which the Post-Intelligencer made on him," said Captain E. E. Caine, of Seattle, to The Oregonian, when he was in the city recently. "By picking him out for attack, the P.-I. called attention to him and aroused interest in his fight, so that many Republicans were personally his friends voted for him, when they would probably have otherwise voted the straight ticket. Then Cuddee would have gone down with the rest of the Democratic ticket. The P.-I. showed bad judgment in this case, as it has in many others."

DEATH OF MRS. NELLIE J. PARROTT.—Mrs. Nellie J. Parrott, wife of E. D. Parrott, died of consumption at 6:20 A. M., last Wednesday, at her residence, 425 East Everett street, after a lingering illness. Her funeral was held at 2:30 P. M. on Thursday, at Lone Pine cemetery. Her amiable disposition had made her a favorite with all who knew her, and her husband and friends were unremitting in their care of her in her last illness. She left a husband, two sisters and two brothers, besides a large circle of friends.

A few days ago Mr. Kert, a hog dealer at The Dalles, shipped to Portland 1000 pounds of fat hogs, and yesterday another shipment of 6000 pounds was received here from him. All these were taken by the Union Meat Company at its Trowbridge abattoir. The Union Meat Company has packed more than 8000 Oregon hogs since October 1.

POLICEMEN MUST WATCH AROUND LIGHTS.—Police have received orders to watch for and report all lights which are out. A great many street lights in Alhambra and in the suburbs, and complaints have been numerous. The Chief of Police has made an order that these lights which fail to burn shall be reported, so the trouble may be remedied and the city will not have to pay for lights that do not burn.

ODD INSURANCE SWINDLE

Texas Men Secure Many Thousands Dollars From Big Company.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 8.—Two men, T. C. Richardson and W. W. Mason, charged with one of the largest and most unique insurance swindles of recent years, are on trial here. It is alleged that they planned to defraud the New York Life Insurance Company out of hundreds of thousands of dollars, and the evidence tends to prove that someone was successful in some instances. The general plan of whoever perpetrated the swindle was to secure the assistance of a healthy man who impersonated a consumptive, the subject of the name on the application, the strong man being the beneficiary. In two instances, involving policies of \$100,000 and \$15,000, the men insured mysteriously disappeared. An examining physician at Dallas today identified Mason as the man who represented himself as one Evans for a policy of \$100,000. Another application for \$100,000 is claimed to have been fraudulent. Other instances will be shown. Bodies of people who died at Chihuahua will be exhumed.
