WILLAMETTE HEIGHTS BRIDGE EXAMINATION.—City Engineer W. C. Elliott has made his expected examination of the dangerous Willamette Heights bridge and has made preliminary estimates on the cost of strengthening the rotten structure by the use of wire cables. To convert the present structure into a suspension bridge will cost about \$150,000, while a new bridge of the same class would cost about \$100,000. A fill of earth across the gulch at Thurman street would require about \$25,000, and a steel bridge considerably more. Four cables, each 400 feet long, would be passed under the bridge, which will then be largely supported by the cables. These would be anchored to logs sunk in the ground at each end of the structure. The steel ropes of the size and strength required cost about \$100 each, and the rest of the expense would be for timbers and labor. The Willamette Heights bridge was built 12 years ago at the expense of John Hale, now deceased, who was then booming property in that vicinity.

TELLS OF ALASKA CROPS

C. C. Georgeson Describes Experiments of Agricultural Department.

C. C. Georgeson, the representative of the Department of Agriculture in Alaska, is down from Sitka for a few weeks, and is visiting the officials of the Federal building.

"Agriculture in Alaska," he says, "is still largely in its experimental stage, and the Department of Agriculture maintains a station at Sitka for the purpose of determining what grains and vegetables will grow in that climate throughout the southern part, fairly good crops of potatoes and various roots are grown, and our attention is now mainly directed to raising wheat."

Winter wheat, which, indeed, does not do so well as the softer spring wheat, and we are also experimenting with winter oats, rye and barley. Agriculture in Alaska has not been taken up seriously, as yet, and few depend upon their crops for their subsistence, as they may safely do here in Oregon."

Runaway Team Collides With Car.

"Look out for the cars," is a sign that is familiar to all team drivers, but yesterday the condition was changed and the cars should have been looking out for a team that came madly tearing down First street. There was no one on the car, however, and as it did not seem to fear the team and the team seemed bent upon taking revenge on the car there was a disastrous collision. One horse was so badly injured that it will probably have to be killed, the end of the car was smashed in, and the wagon was badly damaged. Fortunately, there was no one in the car or in the wagon and no lives were lost. The team belonged to the Powers Furniture Company. The heavy wagon was partly loaded with furniture and the team had been left standing in front of the store at First and Yamhill streets. Something frightened them and they went thundering down First street. They were willing to keep the middle of the street and no one disputed their right

of way until they got to Oak street where an Oregon City car was standing. The team seemed determined to keep the middle of the road and as the car did not move the collision followed. Those who saw it said that the wagon fairly telegraphed the car, and so strong was it that it was not broken. As the horses came against the car they were stopped suddenly, but the heavy wagon behind had a great momentum and they were wedged in between it and the car. One horse was so badly cut up that a policeman was sent for to shoot him. The owner, however, thought that it might be possible to save the animal's life and the shot was not fired.

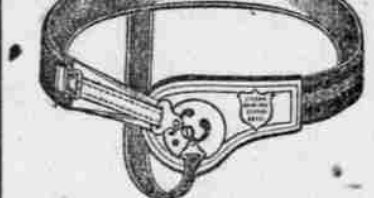

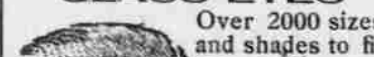
