SALEM, Or., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—The Y. W. C. A. today re-elected the following officers for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. F. F. CHAUTAUQUA MEMBERS MEET.

Board of Directors Held Session at Oregon City.

OREGON CITY, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—Vice-president Charles H. Dye presided over a meeting of the board of directors of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua Association last night. Directors Dye, Steel, Harding, Cross, Ryan and W. A. Huntley were present, and Hawley, Charnley and Galloway were absent. The following committees were appointed: Executive, Dye, Cross, Steel; finance, Charnley, Harding, Huntley; transportation, Steel, Galloway, Cross; athletics, Huntley, Charnley, Ryan; grounds and restaurant, Ryan, Cross, Galloway.

At a meeting of the stockholders of the association, held September 1, the board of directors was instructed to present at a meeting to be held next Tuesday afternoon some plan of reorganization that will make more permanent the association, and at last night's meeting Messrs. Dye, Steel and Cross were named as a special committee to present a plan for the consideration of the stockholders. The idea has been suggested that the stock, now valued at only \$5 per share, be so widely scattered that soon it will be almost impossible to get a majority of the stock at a meeting. If the shares were raised to \$25, or even \$100, per share, the majority stock would then be confined to those who were more directly interested in the success of the Chautauqua, which would have a reserve fund of \$100,000, in the event of inclement weather or adverse circumstances the association would still be on its feet. With the present valuation of shares, a great many people obtain a share and save money by the fact that stockholders are entitled to a season ticket free to each assembly, and have no real interest in the Chautauqua, beyond what it brings to them.

APPLY FOR FRANCHISES.

Roseburg and Eastern Capitalists After Street Railway Right.

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—Representatives of two different companies appeared before the City Council of Roseburg last night asking franchises and street privileges for putting in systems of electric street railways or motor lines. One company is composed largely of local capitalists, represented by and including Hon. C. A. Schilbrede, S. G. Flint, F. E. Alley and H. H. Draper. They have filed articles of incorporation, with a capital stock fixed at \$100,000. If granted the privileges asked, they propose to begin placing orders for materials, etc., within 60 or 90 days and push the work of construction right along.

The other company is composed of Spokane and Duluth capitalists, among whom are F. W. Wegner, of Spokane, and A. J. Grays, of Duluth. This company has a capital of \$200,000, and the promoters also express their readiness to begin construction work as soon as practicable. They already claim the rights of way in the new Great Central townsite addition to Roseburg.

Both companies express their willingness to give bonds for the faithful performance of the required conditions. The matter was referred to a special committee, which will report in a few days as soon as the matter is put into more definite shape as to details, etc. Whichever company is granted a franchise, they express their intention to also extend their line to other points in this vicinity at an early date.

LOGS ADVANCED IN PRICE.

Situation on Lower Columbia Necessitates Such a Movement.

ST. HELENS, Or., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—It is expected that the price of yellow fir logs will be advanced from \$7.50 to \$8 per 100, Monday morning, along the Columbia River. Yellow fir logs bring a much higher price than ordinary fir, and are in great demand. The St. Helens Lumber Company bargained for a quantity of yellow fir logs for a logging firm, and took along a check for \$202 to pay for

EXPLOSION KILLS ENGINEER.

William Morrison Meets Death While in Charge of Dredge at Idaho City.

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 15.—William Morrison, engineer at dredge No. 1 at Idaho City, was killed at 4 o'clock this morning by an explosion. Morrison and James Prince were on the night shift, the latter being in charge of the buckets. A steamship leading from the boiler to the engines was blown out. Prince escaped through the clouds of steam and began to search for Morrison. He first thought he had pumped overboard and reached the shore by swimming. A diligent search failed to bring him to light, however, and the small artificial lake in which the dredge floats was dragged around the boat. Morrison was brought out of the water about 11:30 A. M. The victim is the third of a family of four sons to meet accidental death.

MAY BE LONG-LOST MEN.

Indians Holding White Men Prisoners on Tiburón Island.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 15.—James McCuen, of Hermosillo, Mex., who is now visiting friends in Los Angeles, says that recently a Seri Indian, one of the mainland tribe, who was employed on his cattle ranch, told him that there are seven white men held as prisoners on Tiburón Island. It is believed by those who heard the story of the prisoners that among them are Lieutenant R. E. L. Robinson and his partner, Mr. Logan, of Cleveland, who were taken to the island years ago and never returned, and Captain Porter, of San Diego, another of the several persons whom it was reported were massacred and eaten by the Indians.

ASTORIA NEWS NOTES.

ASTORIA, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—The body of Albert Anderson, who was drowned near Westport on the night of November 7, has not yet been recovered although the stream in the vicinity is being carefully searched. At this time of the year bodies of persons drowned in the river do not usually come to the surface inside of a couple of weeks.

The winter run of steelheads has made its appearance in the Columbia, and many of them are being caught in the up-river traps. The owners of the traps have decided to keep their gear in the water for some time yet.

Mrs. Margaret Frey died at her residence in this city about 10 o'clock this morning after an illness of several months' duration. Mrs. Frey was 56 years of age, was born in Castlereagh County, Keshonagh, Ireland, and had lived in Astoria for about 25 years. She leaves two children, Mrs. Margaret Paulsen, of Brookfield, Wash., and John Ryan, of Astoria. Her funeral will be held at 2:30 o'clock morning from St. Mary's Catholic Church with the interment in Greenwood cemetery.

Bids for Work at Port Stevens.

ASTORIA, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—Bids were opened today by the United States acting construction Quartermaster U. B. A. for constructing sewer and water systems and building roads at the Port Columbia barracks. Fifty bids were received from the following firms: Palmberg & Smith, Astoria; Jacobsen & Bode Company, Portland; Ferguson & Houston, Astoria; H. O. Robinson, Woodlawn, and U. G. Hayes, Portland. Owing to the large number of classifications into which the work is divided it will require considerable time to figure out the bids and ascertain which is the lowest. The contract will amount to about \$30,000.

Damage to Stuslaw Fish Racks.

ASTORIA, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—A letter received this morning by Fish Varden Van Busen from Joseph Stuslaw, who has charge of the state hatchery on the Stuslaw, states that the freshet resulting from the recent heavy rains has caused him considerable trouble. A few days ago the water covered the top of the racks and permitted the escape of many salmon which he had secured for propagation purposes. He has thus far obtained about 500,000 chinook eggs and his racks are still in place he expects to be able to secure as many silversides.

Crushed to Death by Sawlog.

TACOMA, Nov. 15.—Jacob Jacobson was instantly killed this morning by being crushed by a log in the St. Paul & Tacoma Lumber Company's mill. He was working on the log deck, and was handling a log three feet in diameter. He had put the chain around the log, not thinking that blocks under it would be

Vote to Merge School Districts.

WALLA WALLA, Nov. 15.—Residents of School Districts 5 and 37 today voted to merge the two districts. The matter will go before the Board of County Commissioners next morning for ratification. This will be the largest rural school district in Walla Walla County.

Granted a Divorce.

OREGON CITY, Or., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—Eva Lyons has been granted a divorce from Edward J. Lyons, on the ground of cruelty and nonsupport. Three hundred dollars' alimony was granted. The defendants did not appear.

Court Adjourns at Walla Walla.

WALLA WALLA, Nov. 15.—The District United States Court, which has been in session in this city for the last week, was adjourned today. Seventeen whisky-to-Indian cases were brought before the grand jury, and convictions were secured in all but five.

to discuss the proposition of a building. Offers of long leases on buildings in process of construction have been received, but the sense of the local lodge is the purchase of a lot and the erection of a temple.
