COMING EVENTS.

The Portland Sketch Club will give its annual exhibition this week in the lecture-room of the library, this being the fourth year the club has shown the works of its members in this room. Although the stimulus of criticism from an instructor was not felt by the club during the past year, it has had no effect in lessening the number or value of the pictures and studies to be exhibited; the work is but the more improved. There will be many landscapes, figures and still-lives. The club has also shown water-colors-landscapes by Miss Hillier, Miss Stephens, Mr. Wentz, Miss Humason and Miss Fox-and-drawings by Miss Cline. Compositions will be shown in monotypes (examples of this artistic diversion from which such rich and pleasing effects are obtained) and drawings in charcoal and chalk and pen and ink. Needlework Guild Work.

Provides Clothing for Poor, and Needs Aid to Extend Operations.

So much has been written of the Needlework Guild of America that most every one must know what it is for and how much good it is doing. We have just finished our yearly work, and the garments collected have been distributed to the institutions of the city, and several poor families, and we wish to thank those who helped us in our work. We have added to our list many new members, and so have been able to form the guild into sections.

To be a city branch we must have at least 10 sections. At present we have seven and part of another branch. In 1901 we numbered 28 members, of whom 23 were directors. Today we have 37 members and 29 directors. Each section has its president and secretary. They gather in the garments from the directors under them, and report to the branch secretary. Last year we collected about 500 garments.

We have answered calls from the following institutions, giving them as far as we could what they asked for and still have some garments on hand, in case of an emergency: The poor farm, the Florence Crittenton Home, Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, Salvation Army, St. Vincent's Hospital, City Board of Charities, Children's Home, Nurses' Visiting Association, Good Samaritan Hospital, Convent of the Good Shepherd, Volunteers of America, the Baby Home, the Home for the Aged, and four or five poor families. There are calls for many kinds of clothing which we have not received; such as men's suits, coats, underwear, night-shirts and day shirts, for boys, coats, pants, sweaters, underwear and shirts; for girls, dresses, coats and night dresses; for women, coats, dresses, wraps and shawls; all kinds of infants' clothing. Of household linen we need table cloths, napkins, blankets and comforts.

We must now make an appeal to the merchants, as in all other cities the guild receives their help. If the guild is upheld and gets enough members, there will, in a few years, be no need of any begging of the merchants, as this institution is organized to take care of all our city institutions, and the needy poor; and by each one giving a donation of two or more garments (as he can afford) it is not left to a few to do all the work. It also helps the merchants, as most of the garments are bought of them. Those who do not handle clothing may give a donation of money, and so help on the work of the guild.

All firms or persons who wish to become members, by giving not less than two new garments, or pieces of household linen or a sum of money yearly, can send their names and address to any of the officers. Leaflets telling of the guild can be had by asking for them.
