MAKES ITALIANS ANGRY.—A carload of celery and cauliflower received yesterday morning from Los Angeles by Front-street produce dealers. It was a very fine lot, and added to the showing the wholesalers are making of articles for Thanksgiving consumption, but it was far from pleasing to the Italian vegetable gardeners who haunt that district in the afternoon. They held a sort of impromptu indignation meeting on a corner and unanimously voted to boycott the dealers handling the vegetables. They look upon it as an invasion of their rights, believing that outside produce should not be brought in while Oregon gardens are still yielding vegetables. Perhaps if they raised more stuff and of a better quality, it would not be necessary to import from California.

PLENTY OF LIGHT ON THE BRIDGE.—"There is no cause to complain of lack of light on the Montgomery Slough bridge," said C. F. All around the bridge there have only one light to each block of 200 feet. The lights on the bridge are not obscured by trees, as they are on the streets, so that the lights are abundant."
