

DIDN'T WANT ANY TAGS

WARDEN THINKS MOORE HAS NO LEGITIMATE GRIEVANCE.

Deputy Prettyman Says Corvallis Man Expressed Deep Contempt for Game Laws He Violated.

Game Warden Quimby, who received a "roast" at the hands of George H. Moore in yesterday's Oregonian, says that that gentleman has not represented the case correctly. Last October Mr. Moore was arrested by Deputy Warden Prettyman for having failed to attach tags to deer skins, as the law requires. Mr. Moore was fined \$5 in the Justice Court at Corvallis. Now he alleges that the Game Warden discriminated against him by arresting him, and letting other violators of the law go free; that he could not get the tags in Benton County, although the law clearly requires Mr. Quimby to keep County Clerks supplied with them; that men who sell deer skins, and not the purchasers, should be prosecuted for failure to attach tags to the skins, and that Mr. Quimby's deputy willfully confiscated his skins, contrary to law. The prosecution is important as establishing a precedent for Mr. Quimby to work by. Mr. Prettyman said yesterday that Mr. Moore's business, as he detected and saw it, was a "regular smuggling proposition."

"Even if, as Mr. Moore insists, we should go after the persons who sold the skins to him, how do you suppose we could exculpate Mr. Moore?" asked Mr. Prettyman. "Mr. Moore had skins for sale, and they were not tagged. Before he knew who I was he tried to sell them to me. When I called his attention to the fact that the skins were not tagged, he said: 'To — with tags. I never saw one, and I never want to see one.'"

"Well, you'll want to see one," I replied, and thereupon I arrested him. About 80 hides were seized and taken to Corvallis. Mr. Moore was found guilty and fined \$5. In compliance with the law, I asked Judge Holgate what to do with the skins, and he told me to confiscate them. If the Judge now says he didn't tell me to do this, his memory is poor, for I can swear on a stack of bibles that he did."

"Moore's real complaint," said Mr. Quimby, "is the loss of his hides. But they were confiscated as the law directed. If Mr. Moore could not get tags at Corvallis, the trouble was with the County Clerk. I send out tags to all the County Clerks of the state. It is their duty to inform me when they need more, so that I can supply them. If I should send out tags by any other system, thousands would be wasted and the state would lose several hundred dollars a year. But the truth is that Mr. Moore didn't try to get tags, and this is proved by the interview my deputy, Mr. Prettyman, had with him. This pretext Mr. Moore has trumped up since his arrest."

"Mr. Moore says I discriminated against him. Did I? Then why did I recently prosecute a similar case in Douglas County, another in Josephine, and another right in Benton County, where Mr. Moore lives? I prosecuted C. G. Felger at Corvallis just a few days after Mr. Moore was found guilty."

"If there are tanneries violating the law all over the state, I should like to know about them, and if any man will tell me about them, I'll get after them right hot. We have to rely upon information that we pick up, and if the public won't stand in with us, why, we can't prosecute, that's all."

OLD RESIDENT DEAD.

Mrs. Mary Ann Lambert Came to Oregon 40 Years Ago.

Mary Ann Lambert died yesterday morning at her home, 43 Yamhill street, aged 87 years. She had been an invalid for about 20 months. Mrs. Lambert was born in England, and with her husband, Noah Lambert, came to Oregon over 40

years ago. They settled at Milwaukie, and soon afterwards moved to Portland, where Mr. Lambert engaged in the contracting business. He built numerous structures in this city, including the Postoffice building. He died October 27, 1884, leaving an estate valued at about \$75,000, the income of which was bequeathed to Mrs. Lambert while she lived. Mr. and Mrs. Lambert raised a large family of children, but only two survive, Mrs. Ed Mendenhall, of Portland, and Mrs. O. T. Root, of Red Bluff, Cal. There are numerous grandchildren, who receive a share of the estate. The residue was bequeathed in equal shares to Mrs. Mendenhall, Mrs. Root and Mrs. Sarah J. Mason. The latter died since the will was executed, and her children will receive her share.

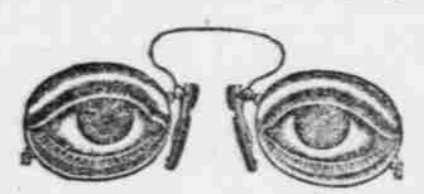
