

BIG SAW WORKS COMING

BUT PORTLAND CITIZENS MUST RAISE \$50,000.

In Order to Get the Industry to Move West, Local Capital Must Be Invested.

Subscription books to the treasury stock of the Andrews Saw Manufacturing Company will be opened at the Merchants National Bank this morning, and it is hoped that the \$50,000 which is needed to bring the large plant in the corporation to this city will be raised promptly. J. Frank Watson will act as trustee, and already some of the prominent financiers of Portland have handed in their subscriptions. One of the first was Henry W. Corbett.

The Andrews factory, owned by E. Andrews & Sons, is at present located in Williamsport, Pa., and has for some time been contemplating moving West. It will bring between 50 and 60 families with it, for all its skilled labor will come, and several cities have tried to secure in one lump so big an increase in industry. But Portland's enterprise has won, and there is practically no doubt now that the deal will go through.

The cost of moving the plant will be \$50,000, and it is to secure this sum that the treasury stock will be sold. The company has been reorganized and incorporated under the laws of Oregon, and, wholly outside the matter of municipal pride, it will prove a splendid investment. On its capitalization of \$150,000 it has been paying a regular 15 per cent dividend, and it is regarded in the trade as about the best piece of property of the sort in the country.

John T. Grayson, who has made a thorough investigation, said yesterday:

"All arrangements looking to the transfer of the plant have been made, and all we need to do now is to raise the necessary \$50,000. It is a magnificent opportunity which Portland cannot afford to let slip. It will bring us at least 50 families, and just the sort of families we want. The Andrews Company ranks high in the commercial world, and its products have a world-wide fame. The firm has been making the very highest class of saws for years, its factory having been originally established in Williamsport in 1852. What makes the investment so good is the company's ownership of almost priceless patterns and designs, as well as of great quantities of costly special machinery.

"We have secured three and one-half acres of land in Portland, with 220 feet of water-front, as a site for the factory, and it exactly suits the company. The work of removal will be begun as soon as the \$50,000 is raised, and we hope that will be subscribed in about five hundred shares of treasury stock will be offered at \$100 per share, and this will pay the cost of the transfer. It will be an expensive piece of work, but it is well worth the money."

Representatives of the Andrews Company are now in the city.
