CACTUS FOR CITY HALL.—A new addition to the City Museum was received yesterday in the shape of a fine specimen of the barrel cactus, which was obtained near Tucson, Ariz., by A. J. Johnson, a short time ago and forwarded to Colonel L. L. Hawkins, director of the museum. The cactus, which belongs to a family that has a growth of 40 feet and a diameter of three feet, was an interesting study to a crowd of people who surveyed it as it lay boxed in front of the City Hall. Everybody, of course, knew what it was, but there was a great deal of speculation as to its weight, and Colonel Hawkins was called upon to decide the question. This he did satisfactorily by displaying the freight bill, which showed that the plant weighed 300 pounds. With that matter off his mind the Colonel found himself confronted by a much more serious question. That was how to place the cactus in the new barrel-box in which it will decorate the City Hall without disfiguring it and without embracing its clustered thorns. After a little skillful maneuvering he contrived to land the cactus in the box, and by tomorrow it will have a prominent place in the museum.

WHY FAIR EXHIBITS PAY.—The good that has come to Oregon from the exhibit is every day making itself apparent to Secretary Lamberson. "The other day," said Mr. Lamberson, "a man came in here and asked for one of the reports. He said he had seen the exhibit at the World's Fair in 1913, and had at last got to the country where they raise apples as large as a fair-sized pumpkin. This is only one example," continued the secretary, "I have many instances of like nature occurring every day."

PORTLAND WOMEN'S UNION.—The regular monthly meeting of the Portland Women's Union will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 at 510 Flanders street. At this time the mortgage of \$500 which has been upon the property of the union for four years will be burned, as the entire amount has been paid off. In celebrating the event the several committees, as well as the other members of the board, will entertain royally friends of the union, and it is hoped a large attendance will be present.

MISS E. N. CLEMENS DEAD.—Mrs. Elizabeth N. Clemens, mother of W. J. and H. E. Clemens, two well-known men of Portland, died at her home in this city last evening shortly before 8 o'clock. Mrs. Clemens, who had been a widow for several years, came with her sons from Ohio to Portland 14 years ago, and has been a resident of the city ever since. She will be buried in Lone Fir cemetery, but the time of the funeral has not yet been decided upon.

MAY TEAR UP PAVEMENT.—The application of the Willamette Iron & Steel Works for a permit to tear up the asphalt pavement on Seventh street, back of the Portland Hotel, which was refused by the street committee of the Council and the Executive Board Friday, was granted by City Engineer Elliott yesterday upon receipt of instructions from the latter committee. The committee had ascertained that the broken boilers of the hotel could not be removed except by tearing up the pavement, and as the pavement must be relaid at the expense of the hotel, it reversed its former decision.

RAISED THEIR SALARY.

Some Professors in the University of Oregon Get More Pay.

The board of regents of the University of Oregon held an adjourned meeting in the office of Judge C. B. Bellinger yesterday morning and discussed the proposed expenditure of the special appropriation made by the last Legislature. Judge R. S. Bean, C. A. Dolph and S. H. Friendly were appointed a committee of three to inspect the university, with regard to the expenditure of the money. The purchase of property adjoining the university grounds was discussed at some length, but it was decided to use the appropriation for more urgent improvements. The library will receive at least \$2000 for books, and the dormitories will be refitted throughout. The water plant will receive a portion of the appropriation, that a more satisfactory supply of pure water may be had. The grounds will be extensively improved, and a few minor alterations will be made on the interior of the buildings.

Some of the professors received an increase of salary, among them Professor Joseph Schaefer, of the department of history; Dr. H. D. Sheldon, of the department of education; C. A. Borden, physical director, and Miss Camilla Leach, librarian. Dr. Charles Friedel, of the department of physics, was granted a leave of absence for one year, which time he will devote to the completion of research work in Germany.

The election of officers, which followed, resulted in the re-election of the entire staff of last year, viz: Judge R. S. Bean, president; Judge Joshua J. Walton, secretary, and C. A. Dolph, Judge B. Bellinger and S. H. Friendly, members of the executive committee.

President P. L. Campbell and Steward L. S. Johnson were in attendance at the meeting. They will return to Eugene this evening.

Added to Agricultural Committee.—Two new members have been added to the agricultural committee of the Exposition in the persons of Sheriff W. A. Storey and P. S. Malcolm. At the meeting of the committee yesterday morning this action was decided upon. Sheriff Storey was present at the meeting and as a token of his gratification at being placed upon the committee offered the use of horses and wagon for the preliminary work on the Fair grounds. Several members of the Portland Rose Society were present and discussed the proposed plot of roses which is to be one of the attractions of the Fair.

Mortensen's Nerve Cost Him \$10.—Peter Mortensen called at the City Jail to see a friend yesterday, and when he was ushered in front of the bars guarding the prisoners' department he was greeted, "Here, take this."
