At this time the army of Penlienties was so immense that the Catholic church to which they claimed allegiance, was powerless to quench the arder of the fanatics at once, but by gradual and un. faltering perseverance, by inflicting vere punishment on participants in the ceremonies who were captured and con-victed, the dominant influence took ef-fect, until at the present time the members of the once mighty organization have dwindled to a few hundred, who are com-pelled to conduct their ceremenies in secret under the most perilous conditions.


