ENDEAVORERS AT A RALLY Annual Meeting Is Held and Officers Are Elected. The Northwestern district, Oregon Christian Endeavor Union, held its first biennial convention yesterday at the First Christian Church, Park and Columbia streets.

Twenty-two societies were represented at the convention. Multnomah, Columbia, Clatsop and Tillamook counties also being represented by one or two members each. Devotional exercises were opened at 9:30 yesterday morning by Rev. Hutchinson, religious director of the Y. M. C. A., J. A. Rockwood presiding.

After roll call the reports of societies and officers were submitted. Rev. Frank H. Mizzell, of Oregon City, delivered an address on "Some Opportunities Before the Endeavorers of this District." Rev. A. J. Montgomery, of the Third Presbyterian Church, also addressed the meeting, his subject being "The Christian Endeavor Advance Campaign."

In the afternoon, at 2 o'clock, Rev. Harry S. Templeton, ex-president of the State Union, conducted the exercises. Mrs. C. E. Eberman spoke on "The Junior Work." Rev. Mr. Eberman conducted a workers' conference.

The annual election of officers took place in the church parlors at 4 o'clock, with the following result: H. A. Start, president; Rev. H. S. Templeton, first vice-president; Rev. J. T. Gormley, second vice-president; Rev. A. J. Montgomery, third vice-president; William McGovern, treasurer; Miss Isabel Coffey, of Astoria, secretary.

At 7:30 last evening a mass meeting was held, J. A. Rockwood presiding. Rev. E. L. House, of the First Congregational Church, was expected to address the meeting. On "Loyalty to Our Church," but delayed trains prevented him from reaching the city in time. Rev. C. E. Eberman filled the vacancy, choosing for his subject, "Endeavor in All Lands." Miss Viola Gilbert sang a beautiful solo at the close of the address.

RATHBONE MAKES APPEAL Says He Was Not Given Fair Trial in Cuba.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Estes G. Rathbone, formerly director of posts at Havana, who was convicted of misuse of funds, but was pardoned under the general amnesty proclamation of President Palma when he assumed office, has made public a statement of his case. This statement was addressed to Senator Platt of Connecticut, chairman of the committee on Cuban relations. Mr. Rathbone has been earnestly urging that action be taken upon his case, and now that Congress has adjourned without such action he has decided to make public his statement.
