MOROS MAY BREAK OUT Trouble Expected on Account Panishment of Raiders.

MANILA. March 21.—There is a feeling of unrest in Joio on account of the arrest and conviction of three prominent Moros, who raided and burned the Chinese district. who raided and burned the Chinese dis-trict of Perang. As a precautionary measure, General Summer, commanding the Department of Minanao, has strengthened the Jolo garrison, and is preparing to send additional troops there. In the event of an emergency, the United States vessels in southern waters will be asked to co-operate with the troops in a demonstration designed to convince the Moros of the folly of an overt act. General Sumner is going to Jolo in the

General Summer is going to Jolo in the ope of allaying the disturbances and onvincing the Moros of the justness of the American policy and the folly of armed resistance.

The raid on Perang was wanton. Thir-teen Chinese houses were burned. The three ringleaders are friends of the Sultan of Jolo, and the people protested against their removal from Jolo, but the sentence will be enforced. The prisoners are now on their way to Billidid prison, Manila. One of the prisoners led a raid in Mindanao during the year 1902. He captured II natives and held them as slaves. The Government failed to arrest him until he was taken into cutody for participation in the Perang raid.
