MOROS MAY BREAK OUT. Trouble Expected on Account of Punishment of Raiders.

MANILA, March 21.—There is a feeling of unrest in Jolo on account of the arrest and conviction of three prominent Moros, who raided and burned the Chinese district of Perang. As a precautionary measure, General Summer, commanding the Department of Mindanao, has strengthened the Jolo garrison, and is preparing to send additional troops there.

In the event of an emergency, the United States vessels in southern waters will be asked to co-operate with the troops in a demonstration designed to convince the Moros of the folly of an overt act.

General Summer is going to Jolo in the hope of allaying the Moros' animosity, and convincing the Moros of the justice of the American policy and the folly of armed resistance.

The raid on Perang was wanton. Thirteen Chinese houses were burned. The three ringleaders are friends of the Sultan of Jolo, and the people protested against their removal from Jolo, but the sentence will be enforced.
