VANDERBILT IS MARRIED

QUICK WEDDING IN LONDON WITH MRS. RUTHERFORD.

BRIDEGROOM CLEVERLY DODGED REPORTERS AND HAS TAKEN HIS BRIDE TO THE CONTINENT.

LONDON, April 25.—William K. Vanderbilt was quietly married to Mrs. Lewis M. Rutherford here this afternoon.

The bridegroom was dressed in a tuxedo and groom started for France, where they probably will remain for some time. Only the bride and groom, including Mrs. Rutherford and Mr. Vanderbilt, were present in the dreary St. Mark's Church, North Dudley street, where the ceremony was performed.

Half a dozen doors from St. Mark's Church is Tarrant's Hotel, now quiet and old-fashioned, but once one of London's most famous hotels.

Mr. Vanderbilt emerged this morning and walked to the office. For the past three weeks he has been staying off and on in a modest apartment at the hotel.

On April 24 Mr. Vanderbilt met his lawyer, Newton Crane, and together they proceeded by a devious route. Mr. Vanderbilt cynically advised that they avoid the best street, the Grosvenor street, the residence of the bishop of London, while the reporters were watching the archbishop of Canterbury's office.

Mr. Vanderbilt was enabled to preserve secrecy regarding the license in consequence of an accident last night, when the Duke of Marlborough wore the usual frock coats.

BEVERIDGE FORESAW IT.

Russia Mistress of Orient and France Will Help.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 25.—Senator Albert J. Beveridge, who two years ago visited Manchuria, foreboded in a series of articles that he wrote on that return to the United States almost exactly such a situation as now prevails.

Of course Russia is not going to give up this dominion, which her money and soldiers' blood has transformed from a region of savagery. The region is being ordered. From personal observation and from conversations with those who knew it, I estimated in 1901 that Russia has in Manchuria and in the southeast corner of Siberia a vast territory which she will strike distance of Japan not less than 10,000 Russian troops.

Russia permanently maintains Manchuria and it becomes a part of the Russian Empire, the East is made the master of the whole Far Eastern situation and Japan thereby loses an advantage which she will be unable to overcome.

Should a conflict come, as in the long run it is bound to come, almost certainly France and Germany will be found allied to Russia. This whole movement involves the entire Chinese Empire.

PIE FRUIT IN REVIEW.

Logan Berry as Good as the Wild Blackberry.

SALEM, Or., April 25.—(To the Editor.)—Replying to Wilbur K. Nowell's communication about the evergreen blackberry and your editorial comment thereon, appearing in last Thursday's and Friday's Oregonian, it should be generally known that up to date horticulturists have developed a berry that transcends anything in the pie-fruit line that has ever appeared as a domesticated berry.

I refer to the Logan berry, a berry originated by Judge J. H. Logan, of Santa Cruz, Cal. The berry is a hybrid, being produced by what is termed among scientific horticulturists "cross fertilization," and was produced by "crossing" the Aughtinghaugh blackberry with the red Antwerp raspberry.

The Logan berry has been successfully cultivated in a small way around Salem during the last year or so, and is pronounced by the fruit eaters to be nearly as good as and eaten it to be equally as good as the wild blackberry. There were last Summer quite a good many in the market here, and the fruit eaters say that the fruit is as large as the largest sized blackberry, of the same form, having a dark red color when ripe.
