BOYS DO CIRCUS STUNTS.

Y. M. C. A. Gymnasium Scene of Entertaining Show.

Those who have been to a real country circus where they have tasted the delights of red lemonade, chewed peanuts and flirted with the elephant, can imagine what an enjoyable time it has been to these last two evenings in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium on the occasion of "A Country Circus," in the shape of the annual gymnastic entertainment given by the leader's club under the direction of M. M. Ringler, physical director. There was a large attendance, and the keenest interest was shown in the exercises. The boys did tricks on parallel and horizontal bars. They tumbled, raced and romped, and built pyramids of their bodies. It was as good as a real circus, and most of the boys thought a little better.

Good order was kept by four clowns, Vignora, Beck, McKennie and McConley, and they furnished fun for the crowd. The proceedings started by a grand procession, led by an imposing drum-major and the life and drum corps. Then came the elephant, which was made up of two boys, the wild man of Borneo, the Zulu, a white bear and a small tribe of chattering monkeys. Chief among the taller animals was the giraffe, and he had a habit of looking over the heads of people. It was as good as being in a menagerie, but the animals in the "Country Circus" did more than amuse in the menagerie, for they chatted intelligently with friends in the audience as they passed. Some of the boys in the gallery took quite a friendly interest in the giraffe, and said: "That's our bill." The polar bear was recognized in spite of his mask, and one boy in the gallery said: "Hullo! That's Tommy. He goes to our school."

Little boys held their breath when they beheld stunts on the horizontal and parallel bars, and one very small boy asked, amid intense silence last night: "Pa, can you do that?"

The person addressed gazed with the eye of a connoisseur at some particularly lively tumbling, and said with an air of pride: "Y. M. C. A. Just then, a boy dressed as a clown acting as the humorist of the party turned a double somersault after a mighty jump from a spring-board, and landed safely on the mat. The hall rang with applause. "Can you do that, pa?" was asked in a childish treble, but this time there were too many people listening, and "pa" did not dare reply. He thought he might probably be challenged to show his skill, there and then, or be dubbed a boaster.

The boys in the junior department did clever tumbling, including cart-wheels. One boy dressed as "The Yellow Kid" was particularly lively. Some commiseration was expressed for one of the young performers, who was dressed as a girl, and this young hopeful had the sympathy of the women in the audience until they discovered that the tumbler was a boy. Ivan Leffer did tight-wire balancing, that would have done credit to a professional, and he was applauded again and again. Fred Applegate's gymnasts in their dumb-bell drill were also favored. Vignora and Leffer did daring feats as Roman ring artists. So did Labstock's crowd in their high leaping from a springboard, and this was one of the main events of the show. It was daring to a degree. The Sunnyside Boys Brigade tactic drill was well executed. Music was furnished for the occasion by the Y. M. C. A. orchestra, under the direction of W. J. Wall. The whole affair reflects great credit on Physical Director Ringler.

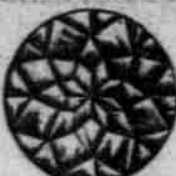

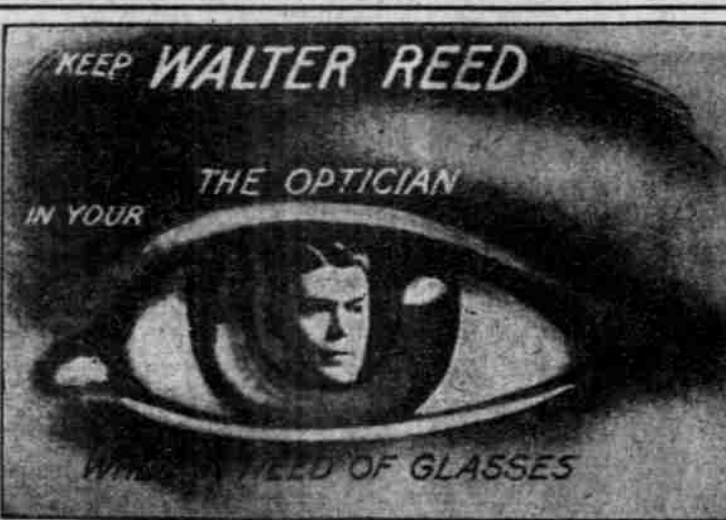

TO SCALE CASTLE ROCK.
 Mrs. Frank J. Smith Aspires to Be First Woman to Make Ascent.

Nine people, headed by Captain Frank J. Smith and Mrs. Smith, left the city last night by the O. R. & N. to spend the night at Columbia Beach, with the object of scaling Castle Rock. The ascent will be attempted this morning as soon as there is sufficient light.

Two years ago Captain Smith led a party of friends to the rock, and on that occasion a white man for the first time stood on the giant boulder that stands as one of the landmarks along the Columbia River. At that time Mrs. Smith secretly made the resolution, when the opportunity presented itself, that she would be the first woman to ascend the high pinnacle. The party who will make the attempt today are well provided with life lines, and all proper precautions will be observed.
