FACTIONS TO UNITE

Republicans of Pierce Will
Form Solid Front.

FOR CUSHMAN AND HAMILTON

Even His Enemies Admit Claims of
Present Representative—Snell Can-
not Run for Governor, but Mc-
Bride Will Be Opposed.

TACOMA, Sept. 5.—(Special.)—Republican factional quarrels will have been settled before the next state campaign opens and no trouble in Pierce County is anticipated. Though there is at present a surplus of candidates, the number is certain to be reduced to two, and to these places Pierce can establish some claim.

The entrance of Ed S. Hamilton into the Senatorial contest has had a tendency to quiet the political storm. It has given a new turn to affairs and practically insures a definite understanding among Republican leaders.

One of the most important changes in sentiment is a disposition on the part of some of his strongest enemies to acknowledge Representative P. W. Cushman's claims to a renomination. There is no doubt that Cushman will be given the support of a solid Pierce County delegation at the next state convention. That there has been opposition to Cushman no one denies, but this opposition has been quieted by the prospect of gaining other ends as important to the anti-Cushman men as the Representative's defeat. It is generally admitted that Cushman's strength in the county would have necessitated a bitter factional fight to turn him down, and politicians feared that a local fight might endanger prospects in the next state convention. Rather than lose any advantage to be gained by presenting a solid front, the leaders of the anti-Cushman forces have passed the word down the line that Cushman is to be given the Pierce County support.

Snell Not for Governorship.
Judge W. H. Snell will not be a candidate from Pierce for Governor. There are several reasons for this change of programme. One of them is Snell's friendship for Senator Hamilton and his desire not to embarrass the latter in his fight for the United States Senate. Another is the feeling that a renomination as County Judge is Snell's just portion, and the third and really most important reason is the serious question of Snell's rights. A question has been raised as to the meaning of the state constitution. It was held by attorneys a few years ago, when Judge Pritchard had political ambitions, that a Judge of a County Court could not be a candidate for nomination to any save a judicial office. It was even held that a Judge could not resign for the purpose of becoming a candidate. Some attorneys hold this is good law, and that Snell could not enter the race, even though he might desire to do so.

James H. Davis has been a candidate for State Auditor and H. B. Dewey has been an ambitious to be State Superintendent of Public Instruction. Davis has made an energetic canvass among county politicians and has surrounded himself with some strong supporters. Dewey has not made much of a campaign, and is not a serious factor, at present, in the county's political fortunes.

It is said that Davis, who has been twice elected County Auditor, has been in return for other favors, to step out of the race. When the time comes to harmonize Republican affairs in Pierce County, politicians insist that Davis will not make any objection to a programme that helps his friends and at the same time protects his own interests.

Pierce for Cushman and Hamilton.
If the Pierce County programme is carried out as now anticipated it will give local Republicans just two candidates; Cushman for renomination to be Representative and Hamilton to be the candidate for United States Senator.

Whether Foster quietly withdraws from the Senatorial contest or not, it is insisted that the county will give Hamilton its support. Certain it is that Hamilton will have all the support of the business interests, most of the politicians, the city administration and the newspapers. With this advantage there should be no question as to the outcome.

One assertion here will occasion some surprise throughout the state. This is the claim that the newspapers will support Hamilton. This statement is made by S. Perkins, who controls the two Tacoma dailies and has four outside dailies. Mr. Perkins stated positively a day or two ago that he would support Hamilton. He believes the business interests in Tacoma demand Hamilton's election and he will support the Tacoma man.

In view of the fact that Mr. Perkins has always been a strong supporter of John L. Wilson, and that Hamilton has been opposed to that faction, it was not anticipated that he would get together with Perkins. It is now stated that Mr. Perkins has told Wilson that he must support a Tacoma candidate, and the two have parted, politically, though not as enemies. Incidentally, a reconciliation between Perkins and the railroad interests is also reported.

Just what effect the decision in Pierce County to support Cushman will have upon the anti-Cushman men throughout the state is doubtful. The assertion was made a short time ago by a prominent Southwestern Washington politician that no one could attach any particular blame to Pierce County politicians if they decided to take up Cushman. "But," it was added, "they must understand they cannot bind us. We must be free to fight him if we choose." And it is probable that the Pierce County politicians have not attempted anything save a reconciliation at home. What they will accomplish on the outside later on is a question for the future.

Pierce a Unit Against McBride.

It is practically certain the county will send an anti-McBride delegation to the state convention. This is being insisted upon by some of the men who were willing to agree to Cushman, but would not give up the fight against the state administration. So far as the anti-McBride fight is concerned, it is not a matter of direct interest to either of the Pierce County candidates, and the demand of others will probably be granted. But, so far as Cushman and Hamilton are concerned, neither is apt to take any part in a fight against the Governor.

The return of Senator Foster is awaited to clear up the atmosphere. The senior Senator has carefully avoided those politicians who are endeavoring to pin him down to a pledge to get out of the Senatorial fight, and it is declared in some directions that he will stay away until he goes to Washington. This is improbable, but it is not certain that Foster will quietly agree to the programme mapped

out for him. Whether he agrees or not, it is held the rest of the plans of Pierce County politicians will be carried out.

The opposition to Representative Jones that shows in the state now and then is not manifested in Pierce as it was at one time. There is a feeling here that if Jones can make any kind of a showing for himself Pierce County will not oppose his renomination. It is fully believed here that Jones will go to Spokane before the next convention, and will come into the state meeting backed by the politicians of that county. As a matter of fact, Pierce County politicians expect their friends will control the Spokane delegation, a circumstance that would deal roughly with precedent, since Pierce County will be controlled by the politicians that have usually fought Spokane.

tries, will hold its sessions in Manchester from October 12 to 16, and beginning October 20, at Cleveland, the American Missionary Association, in charge of the home field, will continue in session through October 22. promise to stop any attempt to pull off the contest itself, but they threaten also to arrest any person who attends the attempt.

"There will be no fight," said John Manning, the District Attorney, to an Oregonian reporter yesterday. Mr. Manning was very positive.

"The public does not want the fight," said he. "The law forbids it and I will not allow it to come off, that's all there is to it."

So victory rests upon the banners of the Municipal Association in its first battle with that large portion of the public which is interested in prizefights and boxing contests.

"So many citizens have called upon me in this connection," said Mr. Manning, "that I had to take some notice of the proposed contest. The managers of the Pastime Club claim that it is not a prize fight, but I think that when two well-known prizefighters enter a 26-round contest for a championship, it surely comes within the class of contest prohibited by the statutes. I didn't mind the law, but it is my duty to enforce it. I know the police will not do it."

Jack Day, who has made all the arrangements for the pugilistic exhibition, was at first inclined to make a test case of the matter, and had some hopes that his claim that he was merely arranging a boxing contest, would be sustained by the courts. This idea, however, practically been abandoned.

"I suppose there is nothing for me to do," said Mr. Day, yesterday, "except to pay the expenses and railroad fares of all the people who have come to Portland on account of this fight, and call it off. I was assured before I made any move in the matter that no objection would be made by the authorities, and while the prohibition will cost me a good deal of money, still I will see that no one else suffers."

The Grant brothers take vigorous exception to the statement that they attempted to deceive the church committee which protested against the Walcott-Jackson fight being pulled off.

"My brother told the committee," said Jack Grant yesterday, "that he would make no attempt to bring another fight off in Portland, if they would withdraw their opposition to the Walcott-Jackson go. Now, they accuse him of bad faith and point to this proposed contest between Herrera and McClelland as proof. The fact of the matter is my brother hasn't had a thing to do with the fight, neither have I. In fact, we both refused to put any money into it or to take any hand in its management. Of course we are not opposed to such contests, and on the contrary think that they are an entirely legitimate line of sport, but we have broken any promise made to the church people. Jack Day has made all the arrangements and will lose all the money. It was to have been his fight, and while we wished him all the luck in the world, we were not in on this contest."

The Municipal Association which originated from a committee appointed by the City of Portland, is apparently to be another of the Law and Order Leagues, which from time to time raise their combative heads in all Western cities. It proposes, as did the others, to reform the city, prohibit prizefights, prevent gambling and possibly to make the North End chase. The executive committee of the association is as follows:

Whistler's Estate Worth \$50,000.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—The probate has been granted for the late James McNeill Whistler's estate, valued at \$50,000.

ket, F. S. Allen and Miller Mendenhall. Here is the constitution of the Portland Municipal Association:

ARTICLE I.
This Association shall be known as the Portland Municipal Association.

ARTICLE II.
This Association shall have for its aim and object, the betterment of the social and moral life of the City of Portland, and to that end shall render to the authorities of the City of Portland all the assistance within its power in the enforcement of law and the ordinances of said city. It shall use any and all legitimate and honorable means to prevent crime, misdemeanor and violations of the law within said city.

ARTICLE III.
The officers of this Association shall consist of an Executive Board of eleven members, a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, which four last mentioned officers shall be chosen from and by said Executive Board, and which Executive Board shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE IV.
All male residents of Multnomah County, Oregon, shall be eligible to membership in this Association if acceptable to the Executive Board, and application for membership in this Association shall be voted upon by ballot by said Board, two-thirds of the vote cast being necessary for admission to membership.

ARTICLE V.
No member of this Association may hold a public office within the State of Oregon, and the acceptance of a nomination for any such office by a member of this Association shall be considered a forfeiture of his membership herein.

ARTICLE VI.
This Association shall not be connected or affiliated with any political party or faction, and shall not take part in any political campaign or take part in the election of political candidates to office, but the members of the Association shall be expected to vote for and assist in the election of candidates to office in said city who shall be men of good moral character and who can be depended upon to enforce the laws and ordinances of said city.

The law prohibiting prizefights reads as follows:

Section 1034.—Any person or persons arranging or attempting to arrange, or offering to arrange, or engaging or offering to engage in a prizefight, to be fought within the limits of this state, or otherwise, in any manner, either as principal, second, assistant, stakeholder, trainer, referee, side, abettor, solicitor or agent, whether said fight shall take place or not, shall, upon conviction thereof, be imprisoned in the penitentiary not less than one year, nor more than five years, or by a fine not less than \$100 nor more than \$500. It shall be the duty of every peace officer and justice of the peace to see that this act shall be enforced; and when any of said officers have reason to believe that said law is being violated, it shall be their duty to institute proceedings against any party so suspected. It shall also be the duty of every Circuit Judge, on charging any Grand Jury, to read this act to said Grand Jury, and it shall be the duty of the Grand Jury to diligently inquire after any violation of the provisions of this act.

A WORD FROM BIDDY BISHOP.

Pugilistic Manager Gives His Opinion of Reform Committee.

"I have not the honor of knowing the gentlemen who constitute the committee that has for its life work the reforming of a city," said Biddy Bishop, manager for Herrera, last night, "but I fancy they are a composed of a bunch of others of their kind. They are men who never do any good so far as reforming goes, for they never start at the right time nor at the right place. They have no place on this good old earth and should be marooned on an island by themselves, then they could give full swing to their ambitions. They are the kind of men who would stand in a driving rain for 48 minutes of a bruising football game, where lads are continually being rendered unconscious, their bones broken so that they are maimed for life, but they would not attend a boxing match because it's brutal." When two men are boxing, in case one of the contestants should receive a blow that would render him unfit to continue the contest ends, but in a prizefight, after the referee has patiently waited along the side lines until the injured player was either recovered and entered the game or carried off the field, they would even applaud the ambulance corps which carried off the injured player.

"I have met these gentlemen who pose as reformers. They blushing protest when reporters call on them, and say, 'I wish to avoid newspaper notoriety.' But the next morning they are waiting on the door steps for the route boys who bring them their papers. These gentlemen of Portland who have bent their energies toward occupying their boxing contest may be very conscientious in their labors, but they seem to have forgotten that they have deprived the city of many thousands of dollars by doing so."

"I am not saying this because I am sore because they won't allow Herrera to box in Portland. It does not matter much to me, but I for one am against a few men virtually holding up the sport of others just because they think the boxing game is not sanctioned by the church. The boxing game is in the hands of very clever men in Portland, men who have a splendid reputation, not only on the Coast, but throughout the East. Your District Attorney is another gentleman at fault. A plaster cast generously applied along his vertebrae would be about the correct thing for him. This committee must have loomed up before this man's vision until they resembled a mental moon calf and a hippogriff mixed."

DEDICATED TO CHINA.
St. Louis Fair Ceremonies Participated in by John Barrett.
ST. LOUIS, Sept. 5.—The site on which the Chinese government will erect a reproduction of the Palace of Prince Pu Lan, as its national pavilion, was dedicated today with speeches, the unfurling of flags and the drinking of toasts from a loving cup. The entire suite of the Chinese government in St. Louis, including the family of the Vice-Commissioner, attended the ceremonies.

A large crowd had assembled to witness the ceremonies. The participants filed into the enclosure, the Chinese Minister Wong walking with President Francis, and Mrs. Wong with John Barrett. Many of the participants wore yellow triangles on which was a blue dragon—the Chinese colors. President Francis wore in his buttonhole a spray of Chinese lilies, which had been given to him by the Vice-Commissioner.

Mr. Barrett introduced Vice-Commissioner Wong to President Francis, who presented him to the audience.

At this juncture, the flags, which had been drawn to the top of the poles in knots were "broken out."

Mrs. Wong, assisted by Commissioner Barrett, unfurled the Chinese flag. Mrs. F. W. Lehman unfurled the American flag. Each flag was dipped three times to salute the other.
