

ALBANY TEAM WINS

Corvallis Students Fail to Make a Point.

A VERY STUBBORN CONTEST

Pilkington the Only Farmer Who Can Make Yardage—Home Team Fumbles the Ball Badly—Rupert Was Loony.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 31.—(Special.)—The Albany College football team defeated the Oregon Agricultural College eleven in a hard-fought battle at Rambler Park today by a score of 6 to 0. The game was purely played by both sides, and when ever a yard was gained it was by hard playing and good team work.

The score does not by any means indicate the true superiority of the sturdy little college team. Corvallis never once had the ball in Albany's territory, and only held the local team for down twice. Time after time the Albany team rushed the ball down the field, only to lose on a fumble within five yards of their opponents' goal.

Within 14 minutes after Vanderhellen kicked off to Corvallis, Albany, by a succession of line bucks and end runs, carried the ball to O. A. C.'s five-yard line, where Albany was fed down, but immediately regained the ball on a fumble and sent Englehard through left tackle for a touchdown, and Morrison easily kicked the goal.

Albany kicked off to O. A. C., who were unable to make their yardage, and Albany took the ball to O. A. C.'s ten-yard line, where it was lost on a fumble, and Corvallis was compelled to punt. The ball was again carried by Albany toward O. A. C.'s goal, where it was tried for a place kick, but failed to land the ball between the goal posts when time was called for the first half.

The second half was played entirely in Corvallis territory, and Albany never failed to score, their superiority in general playing was clearly demonstrated. During the second half Albany strength was greatly impaired by Dupuis going out of the game, and Quarterback Rupert getting a bit on the head, making him so slightly as to seriously disorganizing his team until he was finally removed from the game, entirely out of his head.

Coates then went to quarter, and Francis to half, and Billyue was called in from the side line. Throughout the game Albany's speedy backs repeatedly directed the O. A. C. end for good gains, although few long runs were made by either side, the order of the day being short line bucks and end runs close in.

For Corvallis Captain Pilkington was the only player able to make any headway when his team had the ball, and on the defensive he played a star game. For Albany every play was made by the backs, and it would be difficult to find any particular player who played superior to his teammates.

Last Saturday's game was a good loss to Albany, and her playing today was exceptionally good, considering the crippled condition of many of her best players. Morrison tried three times for place kicks, but was unable to get the ball between the posts.

Punting honors were about even, Pilkington kicking for Corvallis and Morrison and Coates for Albany. The game was somewhat of a surprise to the O. A. C. adherents, as after Albany's showing at Eugene last Saturday Corvallis expected an easy victory. This makes two straight games Albany has won from O. A. C.

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POTLATCH LOGGERS ON STRIKE

Object to Payment of Monthly Hospital Fees.

COLFAX, Wash., Oct. 31.—(Special.)—One hundred and six men employed in the logging camps of the Potlatch Lumber Company, of Palouse, are on strike because the company compelled the payment of \$1 per month for hospital fees. The strikers left the logging camps and went to Princeton, Idaho, and Palouse, where they are going, evidently, to prevent others from taking their places.

The men were getting from \$5 to \$65 per month, and were being organized into a union by H. L. Hughes, of Spokane, two months ago, and trouble has been brewing since. The men had no grievances on wages or recognition of the union. The mill has logs to run two or three months.

Should the strike continue, it will close the largest sawmill in Eastern Washington, a branch of the Potlatch Lumber Company. Merchants of the Palouse condemn the strike in unmeasured terms, and are trying to assist in breaking it.

HURLED FROM HIS ENGINE.
Fireman Loses Balance on Curbs and Receives Facial Injuries.

SPokane, Wash., Oct. 31.—(Special.)—John Shaski, a fireman, fell from his engine last evening near Lamona, Wash., and received facial injuries. It is believed that while swinging a shovel full of coal to the firebox, the balance on the engine went around a curve at high speed and was shot out from the locomotive.

His absence was not noticed by the engineer until the train had made about five miles. The train was backed to the scene of the accident, and a brakeman picked up the senseless body of the victim and carried him to the train.

At the time of the accident the train was making about 40 miles an hour. Shaski was thrown violently to the rocky ground. The worst external wound was a hole about two inches wide in his forehead. He also sustained a fracture of his collarbone, two fractured ribs and probably internal injuries. He is dying.

MILL IN SOUTHERN OREGON.

Pennsylvania Capitalists Preparing for Heavy Cut of Timber.

ROSEBURG, Or., Oct. 31.—(Special.)—The Ketchikan-Skeley Lumber Company, has been incorporated here, by W. J. Ketchikan, John K. Skeley and W. J. Sykes with a paid-up capital stock of \$50,000. The company has already acquired about 2000 acres of fine timber land on Billy Creek, a few miles west of Yoncalla, in this county.

A sawmill building has already been erected and part of the machinery is now in place. The plant is located on a hillside, and will be ready for operation within 30 days. A flume will be put in from the mill to carry the product direct to the river, where a lumber yard will also be established.

SAYS MISS NESBITT LIVES.

Norman Williams Ready for Trial on Murder Charge.

WHATCOMB, Wash., Oct. 31.—From a trustworthy source it is learned that Norman Williams, under indictment at Portland, Or., for forgery and under suspicion of having murdered his former neighbor, Mrs. Nesbitt, is still alive. Williams, who is a native of Oregon, has little fear of being tried for the last named offense. Miss Nesbitt is said to be alive, and should circumstances demand it, she will be produced.

Williams has resided in Fairhaven for 3 1/2 years, and has a wife and home. He has received no reply from his telegram notifying the United States District Attorney at Portland of his whereabouts, and is at a loss to understand the reason.

CLOTHING CAUGHT FIRE.

Little Girl is Fatally Burned Near Cornelius.

HILLSBORO, Or., Oct. 31.—(Special.)—The little 4-year-old daughter of Charles Rockstroff, of near Cornelius, died this morning from the effects of a severe burn. The child was playing around an outside fire yesterday afternoon and her clothing was ignited. The mother, who was at the house, saw the child and tried to extinguish the blaze, but could not. An older brother finally carried the little one to a watering trough and put out the fire. The child was badly burned about the chest and face.

LEFT ARM IS TORN OFF.
Frightful Accident in the Albany Woolen Mill.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 31.—(Special.)—Leslie L. Potts, an employee of the Oregon City Manufacturing Company, had his left arm torn off in the woolen mill here today. Potts, who is an old woolen millman, was putting up the machinery in the factory at 70 revolutions a minute when his hand was caught and carried into the machinery, tearing his arm off below the elbow.

He was taken to the hospital, where his arm was dressed. The wound will not prove fatal.

Looking for Reservoir Sites.
ASHLAND, Or., Oct. 31.—H. E. Green and J. E. Reese, of the hydrographic and geological survey, arrived in Ashland last night from San Francisco. They are in the reclamation service and will cross the mountains eastward from here on an expedition to locate possible sites for reservoirs for the storage of waters for irrigation purposes. They go to Pelican Bay, Fort Klamath, The Agency, Sprague River Valley, Bly and Bonanza, and their itinerary will take in all the Modoc lava beds and the Honey Lake district.

They will survey the country and expect to be in the field until snow falls. Mr. Green says that whenever an eligible site for a reservoir is found, workmen will follow them and engage in construction work. This is the first appearance in Southern Oregon of Government hydrographers in the interest of irrigation work since the passage of the act for the reclamation of arid lands by Congress.
