DEATH OF A PROMINENT WOMAN.—On November 2, at 2 A. M., Mrs. May A. Cox died after a short illness. She was a member of the chapter of the Order of the Star of St. Helena, of the Oregon Assembly, No. 1, of the United Artists, and had held the office of chief of honor of Evergreen Lodge, Degree of Honor, for the past year. This lodge conducted the funeral services at the home and at the grave Wednesday afternoon. The remains were interred in Riverside cemetery. Mrs. Cox was born in Linn, Me., on February 4, 1850, coming to Oregon in 1870, and has resided here since. She was married to Captain James Cox on December 19, 1880, and her husband and four children survive. They are: James G. Cox, Charles A. Cox, Opal A. and Forrest W. A. Cox, all of this city. Her mother, Mrs. S. E. Henderson, and one sister, Mrs. C. L. Doggett, also reside here.

SOCIAL AT PHYSICAL CULTURE SCHOOL.—The first social event at Professor Ringler's Physical Culture School will be given as a ladies' night next Friday, November 13, when all members of the school, together with their friends, will be invited to attend.
