EXPOSITION GAINS IN CONGRESS.—Henry E. Reed, secretary of the Lewis and Clark Exposition, received a letter from Senator W. Fulton yesterday. The letter follows: "Washington, Nov. 30.—Mr. Henry E. Reed, secretary, Lewis and Clark Exposition: My Dear Mr. Reed—I have just received your letter of the 24th inst., giving me additional statistics relative to the production of precious metals within the Oregon Country. The additional information is very valuable, and I am very glad to receive it. The Mitchell dinner in aid of Lewis and Clark Fair was a most pronounced success. It resulted in securing expressions strongly in favor of an appropriation in aid of the Fair from persons whose aid we had very little hopes of securing. I have now more hopes of success than I ever had."

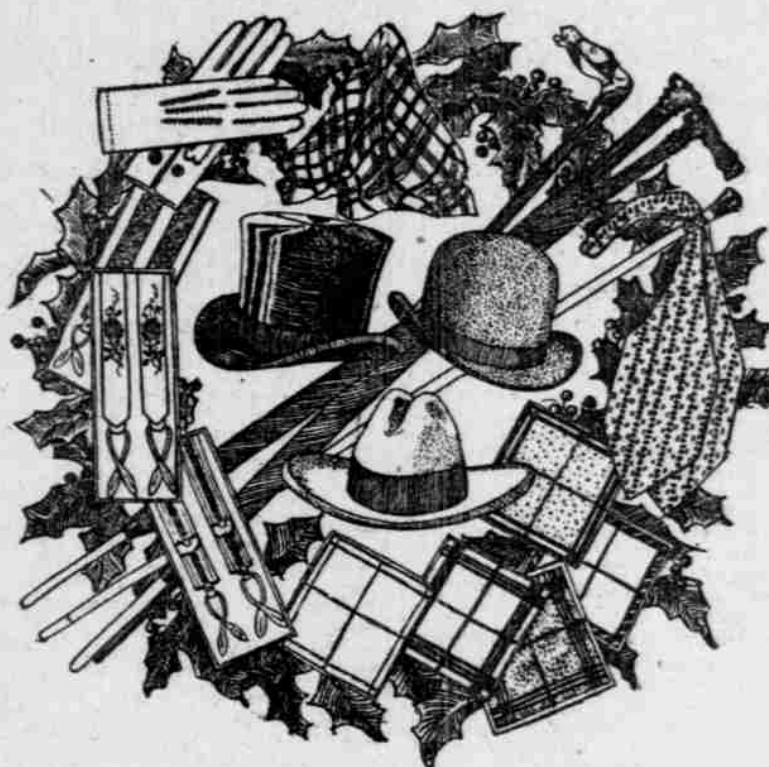
