LOST THEIR INFANT SON—Friends will be pained to learn that a great bereavement has befallen Mr. and Mrs. J. LAWYER ACCUSED OF FRAUD—L. A. McFadden, a Lincoln County attorney, was given a preliminary examination before Judge Hogue yesterday on a charge of forgery. The complaining witness is J. B. Tillotson, a contractor. It is charged that McFadden drew a check for \$350 on Tillotson's bank account, claiming the amount was due him for services rendered. The contractor, Tillotson, says the defendant had but \$245 due him and had not been authorized to issue a check for a dollar, having deliberately forged the check. McFadden was held in \$1000 to answer to the grand jury.

PRIDE PRIZES OF GREAT PRICE—Pearls have been taken from many Portland lobsters, it is said, but during the past week there was a bona fide case of pearls being taken from oysters. INSANE PATIENTS FROM ALASKA—The Crystal Springs Sanatorium, which received from the Government the contract for taking care of the insane of Alaska for the ensuing year, brought down from Salem yesterday the first installment of cases. The Oregon State Insane Asylum had the contract last year, and had 41 Alaska patients in that institution. Of the entire number two are Alaska Indians. The management of the Crystal Springs Sanatorium has provided a separate building for the care of the Government patients half a mile from the private sanatorium itself. The new institution is to be known as the Morningstar Asylum to distinguish it from the sanatorium proper, with which it has no connection.
